Building and Grounds Report by Chris Thompson



It has been a medley of both planned and unplanned projects for Building and Grounds at AYC this year. Having some concept of what I was getting myself into, I was not totally taken aback by the task at hand, but it has still proven a rewarding challenge. With a vintage facility such as AYC, you learn to plan for something to go amiss, be it ancient plumbing fittings for which no replacement exists or the weather peeling off decals from a

freshly painted sign. And of course the flood drill.

With respect to the ongoing bath house remodel, painting is mostly complete, the contractor has completed demo of the old showers and is working to upgrade the plumbing fixtures and drains; ceiling tiles and insulation are nearing completion. Tile walls and floor will be installed in the showers along with new shower curtains. Completion of these tasks will be proceeding through the end of the year. New toilet and urinal partitions are on order. Upgrades to the counters, mirrors, and sinks will be addressed in the coming year.

The new water heaters are now firing on all cylinders after replacing the LP gas line. Impingement on the undersized plastic gas line caused the pressure to drop below what was needed for the furnace or water heaters to operate. Huge thanks to **Tom and John Kuc** for manning the trencher. It took about 6 hours to cut the trench through rock, asphalt and tree roots. The new line has been installed to proper code for buried LP gas lines by our LP supplier. We also trenched for the RV electrical outlet installation for cabin 1.

Sail Training Report by Bill Records



At the beginning of the year the Sail Training Committee had high hopes and submitted a very ambitious budget. At the end of the year, expenses came in under budget while revenues were up around \$13K, for a net profit of around \$54K! These were very good numbers considering that 2016 was a transition year. Sailing Director **Kate Noble** resigned in March to take a job in Annapolis, MD. Assistant Coach, **Coleman Terrell**, was hired to replace **Kate and Gracie**

Bulgerin was hired as Assistant Coach. The changes went very smoothly due to **Kate** working very hard to prepare **Coleman** for his new position. **Coleman** stepped up and performed admirably and ran the summer camps without a hitch. I think that the 2016 camp staff was the best we ever had.

In 2016 we increased the emphasis on adult training, offering more clinics and private lessons than before. We used the learn to sail classes to promote membership. The FJ Learn to Sail classes have become very popular and we hope to offer women's FJ classes next year.

The Junior Program has grown to its highest level ever. We had 14 kids registered for Opti 1 this year, the most ever! 11 kids registered for Laser practice, the most ever! Our Juniors are traveling in large numbers and winning lots of trophies at TSA regattas.

All of this success is the result of excellent coaching by **Coleman and Gracie**, and dedicated parents and volunteers. Whenever a project or task is proposed, everyone pitches in and things get done. I have never worked with a better group of people and I can't thank them enough. My time serving as Sail Training Commander has been very rewarding and I have enjoyed every minute of it. I am confident that the future of sailing education at AYC is in good hands with **Carolyn Wilsford** and I hope everyone will give her the



support she deserves.

From Jackie's Heart ...

The subject of my sharing this month is about the extraordinary outpouring of caring and kindness I've received from the Board, the staff, the members and the extended support family of Austin Yacht Club during the past several weeks.

Over the past several years I've had the opportunities and pleasure to applaud, in print, the generosity

of the many members dedicated to helping the Yacht Club and its staff in so many ways: the volunteers who make this Club so special, the money provided by the AYC Fund to assist in so many beneficial projects, the scholarships that make it possible for young sailors to learn the art of sailing; and the staff who help member's ideas become realities.

Those, and many more, are manifestations of the members of this Club's generosity, but never did I think I would be the recipient of its overwhelming beneficence.

For this unexpected and scary medical episode in our life, **Paul and I** owe an enormous debt of gratitude to so many who unselfishly gave of their time, love and support to allow us time to concentrate on taking care of **Paul**. His leukemia is in remission and we are doing follow up treatments to assure that it stays that way! There are so many of you we are indebted to, I dare not name you for fear of overlooking someone. To each and every single one of you, THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU!

You don't realize how much you depend on other people until you need them. People say that the people of the South are so willing to help. The words "Southern hospitality" are synonymous with Austin Yacht Club. This latest example of the AYC community's kindness and generosity will never be forgotten. One of my new year's resolutions is to "pay it forward" whenever I get the chance.

I wish you a very happy, healthy and peaceful new year, and look forward to sharing a great year of sailing and friendship with you.

In August of 2015, a lot of things in my life changed as my family and I moved from Corpus Christi to Copperas Cove, a small town outside of Fort Hood. Despite all the changes, one thing stayed the same: my sailing. Before we moved, my



mom contacted the Austin Yacht Club to see if they would be willing to add me to their team. I had been sailing with the CCYC race team for two years and had competed against the AYC team many times so I knew they were a good team with good people.

Luckily, **Coach Kate** told my mom that I could definitely join,

but I did need a membership interview first. I admit I was a little nervous, but when I walked in **Jeff Brock** recognized me and seemed happy to have me join the team. I was relieved and excited because I wouldn't have to give up the sport I loved so much. Unfortunately, there was one big problem; I did not have my own boat. As much as my mom and family would love to buy me a boat, it is not something they could ever afford so I had always rented my boats from CCYC.

AYC, as you might know, does not have this option which meant I could practice, but I couldn't travel to compete. This was disappointing because I really wanted to be ranked in the 2016 competition year since I had narrowly missed in the years before. We searched for solutions, but we couldn't find one until **Coach Kate** sent out an email about an AYC scholarship boat. I applied and allowed myself to feel a little optimistic. If I received the scholarship, I could try to reach my goals of being ranked and participating in Race Week in Laser. I cannot describe the excitement and relief I felt when we were notified that I had been selected. All my goals were within reach now.

Having ended the season in 9th place and having competed in the Laser 4.7 for Race Week, I can honestly say that I have been lucky. When I attended Learn to Sail at CCYC three years ago, I never would have thought I'd be in this position today. I owe much of my success to my great coaches: Hunter Farris and Ben Moreno of CCYC and Coach Kate and Coleman Terrell of AYC. I am also grateful to the Roadrunner Racing Team for accepting and always helping when I need it. I also need to give a huge thank you to the Roadrunner Parents, especially the Froelichs, Heitkoetters, Brocks and Mrs. Butler for always making sure my boat got where it needed to be and helped when I had an inevitable, seconds before launch boat repairs. I am lucky to count myself a sailor among these wonderful people and team and I look forward to many years competing with them. Lastly, I would like to thank my mom because without her, none of this would be possible. No matter how hard times get, she always makes sure I am able to sail and puts my passion before everything else. She has driven countless hours, scrounged sailing from everywhere possible, and has continued to be my biggest supporter and cheerleader. She is awesome, so thank you mom.

My mom always told me that when I was little and we visited family in Corpus Christi, I would beg her to take me to see the sailboats docked at the piers. She said I would always point to the boats and say that I would be a sailor one day. At the time, it seemed far-fetched for a kid from a single parent, non-sailing household, but here I am today. I am not only a sailor; I'm ranked sailor on one of the best teams in Texas. To say that I am lucky and thankful would be an understatement; but, know that as a thank you to everyone who has helped along the way, I plan to be the best sailor I can be. I will always hold the lessons I have learned through sailing and my passion for the sport close to my heart.

Though Linda has been a celebrity at AYC for decades, she became the racing world's darling as she went on her journey, faced with national TV and media cameras, and interviewed multiple times by journalists from town newspapers to NBC's TODAY show hosts; always with grace and humor. The iconic images of Linda at her favorite place on the yacht – the top of the mast – have become ingrained in the racing world's eyes and heart. Yet, in spite of her celebrity status and incredible accomplishment, Linda returned to AYC, volunteering to fix food for regattas, continue her mentoring of new and old sailors alike, and happy to share her stories with us. We're incredibly proud of you, Linda, and happy to call you one of our own.

On the afternoon of November 21, 2016 we lost **Bill Howard**. I like to consider him to be part of Austin Yacht Club's Founding Fathers Group 1A. Like our clubhouse architect **Tom Leech**, constitution writer **Conrad Werkenthin**, sailboat builder **Pat Kimbrough**, and student member **Russell Painton**, they weren't ready to fund the new sailing club but they were

there at or near the beginning working on the project. Certainly I missed mentioning some very important folks. The "Let's Build a Yacht Club" purchase of the Beacon Lodges property by **Tom Romberg, Hap Arnold and Frank McBee** set off an explosion of interest. There were already 200 members by the time the clubhouse was opened in 1970.

In the sixties, **Bill and Conrad** started a little sailboat dealership they called SailAway. My first Austin boat repair shop served as SailAway's maintenance shop in 1981. The rest of the 1981 SailAway team, **Hap McCollum, Rolly Lawson, Teri Nelms Smith, Conrad, and Bill** have left me as the only living alumnus. The toys they brought to the Club are still providing lots of fun. SailAway sold San Juan, Columbia, Merit, Coronado, Express, Prindle, US 1, Olson, and had a little ships store where sailors from IBM, TI and other nearby companies gathered to tell lies after many races. For many years, the Keelboat Fleet was almost as much based out of SailAway and Dodd Street marina as AYC.

In 1980 Bill, his son Clarke, and Hap McCollum brought Starshine the Columbia 9.6 to become a fixture at AYC. **Bill** bought it from the Colgate Sailing School when Colgate introduced its Colgate 26 as its teaching platform. As a sailing school boat, Starshine's job was to provide a learning experience for sailors planning to charter and own virtually any sailing boat. For that reason Starshine came with rigging appropriate for a fifty foot boat. Teri decided the Fireball Fleet sailors knew all about rigging, which we didn't, and conscripted us to sail on Bill's new toy for the Turnback Canyon Regatta. Luckily we went out and practiced for a few evenings before the regatta. Linda McDavitt did the sensible thing and grabbed the helm. The rest of us had to figure out how to fly a spinnaker with four sheets (when gybing the unloaded sheet was threaded through the spinnaker pole and we had to do a dip pole gybe) and a reaching strut. Actually, I didn't as I decided to handle the main sail and its insane rig with a traveler lines, outhaul, inhaul, topping lift, Cunningham, vang and a spaghetti of reefing lines (Thank Gawd we never used) run to various halvard locks, cleats and self tailing winches. I spent the weekend tweaking every line and watching the various tell tales move and asking Linda if what I just did helped. Her reply was always, "I can't feel a thing on this boat."

All that mattered to **Bill** was keeping an eye on his old boat "Sweet Caroline" the Coronado 28 being helmed by his lovely wife. **Caroline** was a nationally known Snipe sailor and she seemed to know how to find winds on the crazy trip to Lago Vista better than the combined Fireball Fleet. We sailed much faster but **Caroline** kept going the right way.

When we got to Lago Vista there were various claims made for the v berth. Bill settled that argument in one sentence. "Fred and Sally are the only ones here who are married."

A couple years ago **Bill** was at the shop while we were giving **Linda's** J-22 trailer a pre-regatta trip inspection. Sitting at Los Pinos a few minutes later **Bill** told us, "If anybody but **Linda McDavitt** had steered Starshine in that Turnback Regatta I would still own that fool Coronado."

Bill loved to come grab **Alfonso Ramirez** and me and take us to lunch. It was much more about his stories than the free food. **Bill** simply knew lots of stuff and we occasionally got a little glimpse into his personal history:

*I never got to play much football, Wilkinson thought I was too slow. (**Bill** went to Oklahoma)

* I was at a party with a bunch of orthopods and they kept saying Yale this and Yale that. So What! I went to Harvard. (**Bill** went to Harvard Business school and he had a nickname for Orthopedic Surgeons)

*We built this set of bolts to hold Bombs on wings and they had to be inspected 17 times but we couldn't have any written records.

*We dredged 107 million cubic yards of sludge out of Town Lake so it wouldn't be a swamp.

* Lady Bird was a Peach. Lyndon was an ass. (**Bill** spent a lot of time with Lyndon while Ladybird and **Caroline** set up the National Wildflower Research center.)

* There are a whole series of huge reservoirs near McAllister OK whose purpose was to put water in the Arkansas River so it remained navigable in dry months.

*He designed the cooling system to keep the freshly poured concrete from overheating so Amistad's Dam would have good concrete. He did not do Canyon Lake's dam "which is why it is screwed up."

*Before there were docks, **Bill and Conrad** put a string of mooring buoys in the AYC Harbor held by two anchors. "**McBee** called me and told me he had borrowed my anchors to hold the new docks." Last I knew, **Bill's** anchors were still holding the outboard ends of Docks one and two.

*I THINK **Bill** told me he delivered and set up **McBee's** big anchor by the clubhouse.

*On at least two occasions **Bill** had stood silently in the back of the crowd during the AYC annual meeting and finally decided enough was enough. In the middle of two particularly heated discussions **Bill** stood up and boomed, "**William F. Howard** here. I move we adjourn." In both cases there was a second and the meeting simply adjourned.

Another year, during an argument about numbers of more permanent members on the AYC Race Committee **Bill** suggested the same solution, was shouted down, and **Russell Painton**, who was commodore, decided the necessary quorum was not present to make any decisions, and adjourned the meeting.

*Bill rebuilt the big gooseneck trailer that has been an AYC feature since 1969 from some sort of water hauling farm trailer. He built it to pick up a Columbia 22 from California. Forty years later we used the trailer to carry Bay Peterson's C&C 37.

The greater concern, because each of us has an opportunity to do something about it, is to inspire some of you to visit with and get to know the fabulously interesting sailors who are still with us. This year we lost not just **John Vance, Beverly Kimbrough and Bill** but we were rocked fifty years too early by the loss of **Jacob Lien and Tony Slowik**.

Over the past 37 years, my business has allowed me to get to know hundreds of our Club's members. As a regular sailor guy Club member, it is a bit more challenging to interact with those not in our own fleet or whose slips are nearby. Race committee, regatta work, work parties, and social events really are a very special opportunity. If **Teri** had not dragged the Fireball Fleet out to sail with **Bill** on his monster keel boat, I might never have met the guy. Here is my request.

If you see a face at the Club and you can't attach a name, be bothered and go do something about it. If all you know is that name, do something about that too. **Bill** was a VERY special fellow. AYC is filled with a fantastically diverse group whose individual levels of special rival **Bill's**. Go find out why.

In Memoriam



Jul 13, 1930 - Nov 21, 2016

WILLIAM FULLER HOWARD

William F. Howard, age 86, died Monday, November 21, 2016 in Austin, Texas.

Bill Howard was born on July 13, 1930 in McAlester, Oklahoma. He

was the only child of Isabel Fuller Howard and Harold Spink Howard. As a boy, he built and designed gadgets in the covered warehouse next door to his childhood home, and he had his own business selling eggs. He loved the outdoors and participated in Boy Scouts, earning the rank of Eagle Scout, and his enjoyment of the outdoors continued with hunting and camping throughout his life.

Bill attended the New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) for high school, and got a head start on his military service in ROTC. He went to the University of Oklahoma and graduated with a degree in Civil Engineering. He belonged to the Beta Theta Pi fraternity. While in college, he met the beautiful Caroline Clarke, a champion ice-skater and sailor.

Bill and Caroline were married in 1953. Bill joined the Army as a lieutenant and was promptly shipped to France. He and Caroline lived on the economy in France for two years, while Bill helped build air force landing fields and dig wells for military bases in France and Spain. He returned from military service and entered Harvard Business School in 1955. At the end of their first year in Cambridge, their son, William Clarke Howard, was born. After graduation, Bill worked for the H.B. Zachry Company and the family lived in San Antonio, Sweetwater, and El Paso. Projects he worked on included building a portion of IH-10, a sewage treatment plant in Sweetwater and a runway of the El Paso Airport. A second son, Jeffrey Stephen Howard was born in 1958.

The family moved to Austin in 1960, where Bill became the plant manager for Capitol Aggregates, a supplier of sand and gravel for civil and construction projects. In this role, Bill was personally involved in the dredging of the Colorado River to

make Town Lake in downtown Austin (now known as Ladybird Lake). After leaving Capitol Aggregates, Bill designed, built and managed SuperRock, a lightweight aggregate plant near Corsicana, Texas. Bill's last business was Grentek, a sheet metal fabrication company for the needs of local high-tech industry.

In Austin, Bill was a member of several civic groups including the Chamber of Commerce, the Admirals Club and Boy Scouts, serving as leader of Troop 59 at St. Matthew's Church. Bill remained an avid outdoorsman and sports enthusiast. He was part of the "Nine-Tenths" Club, cheering for UT football (except when they played one's own university), a founding member of the Austin Yacht Club, a competitive sailor for decades, a pilot, and a hunter. After attending a sail-racing school in Rhode Island, the family bought the sailboat "Starshine" from the school, and he and Clarke sailed the boat from there to Galveston, bringing it overland to Lake Travis. He enjoyed yearly hunts in south Texas, with friends and his favorite companion, the smiling Labrador retriever, Rock.

Caroline passed away in April of 1989 after a long battle with cancer. Three years later, Bill married Dr. Barbara Alford (Bobbie). They enjoyed their semi-retirement years together renovating their new home, backpacking, sailing and travelling, most notably taking a wedding trip to Tanzania and Botswana.

Bill was preceded in death by Caroline and his son Jeff. Survivors include Bill's wife, Bobbie; son, Clarke and his wife Rosemary; grandchildren Cameron, Christian, Catherine and Rebecca Howard; stepdaughter Elizabeth Alford and her husband Michael Young, and their children, James and Clara Young; niece Caroline Young and her husband Rick of Oklahoma City; and nephew Bill Payne and his wife Wendy of Dallas.

The family would like to express a huge heartfelt thanks to the wonderful caregivers from Nurses Case Management; Yomi Alimi, Angela Dean, Bettina Howard, Mary Brown, and Patrick Agwuegbulum.
