Buildings & Grounds Report by John Saunders



February was highlighted by the Building & Grounds Work Party the day before Opening Day. Approximately 35 willing souls came out with rakes and shovels, trimmers, and a caulking gun.

In addition to seven trees and shrubs already planted, we planted nine more trees and shrubs, dressed up the sites and others, and

cleaned up around them. This included the entire area of the entrance drive and filling over 800 feet of drip irrigation trench. All of the new plantings as well as some of the older ones will now automatically get a drink. You will also find some automatic shut-off valves on hose bibs. These are simply clock work shut-off valves that will turn off after the time you set runs out. We are seriously trying to conserve water.

Over 200 marigolds were planted near the anchor, while over 25 bags of leaves were raked from the front yard and patio area. The shrubs in that area received their annual pruning.

In shelter 4, now the social committee store room, shelves were constructed to get supplies off the floor.



Coffee, juice, bagels and sausage were served for breakfast, as well as sandwiches and cookies for lunch. I hope no one left hungry.

The results of a day like this are visible; however, like sailing, the people met, ideas shared, and friends made are the true value. This was a wonderful group of AYC members getting together and enjoying the company of other members.

Other noteworthy accomplishments: A table with chairs was added to the south club deck. The UT Team storage building is being repaired and should be good for another decade or so. A storage building for the UT Club has also been added.

February was a busy month for the Race Committee both on and off the water. The Frostbite Series was completed. Three of the five scheduled races were finished. 40 boats completed at least one of the races, with the biggest group coming from PHRF Spinnaker A fleet.

Brad Davis was the instructor for a course on the Racing Rules of Sailing, with discussion of the changes that



have been made. The most recent four-year rule book is available, with rules that will apply from 2013-2016. The entire stock of books that the office had received was sold out at the event.

New books are on order. We had 45 participants at this seminar, ranging from Hap Arnold, one of our founders, to the newest members of the club. There is always something more to learn about our sport of racing sailboats.

Tom Cunningham finished his winter project of refurbishing a used Monark chase boat to replace the aged Chase 3. This boat is now the pride of the fleet and performed admirably as the race committee boat for the Opening Day Regatta. Check it out on the Race Committee dock, it has a pretty new orange look provided by Fred Schroth of Schroth Fiberglass.

The Opening Day Regatta was held on Sunday, March 3. Your board of directors served as race committee with help from past commodore **David Lewis**. **Jenny Loehlin and Jen Schwan** assisted me on Chase 3, the RC boat. Running a race in the wind from a chase boat makes you appreciate our large orange RC boat even more. **Molly Lewis and David** were on the other available chase boat. **John Saunders** provided rescue and towing services and **John Morran** was the race committee for the Opti fleet which braved the windy day.

Sailing Director Report



The 2013 Sail Training season is finally here! Sail Training Commander, Jennifer Loehlin, and I have been hard at work over the offseason to develop a training schedule for sailors of all ages and skill levels. Here is an overview of what's to come this spring:

Adult Training

Our first adult clinic of the season will be a Basic Keel Boat Clinic on March 23, led by former Sail Training Commander, **Bill Records**. This half-day clinic will include classroom and on the water instruction and is designed for beginner and intermediate sailors. Registration is online - visit the AYC website today and sign on up.

On April 20, **Scott Young** will host a Start Clinic that you will not want to miss! This year, the clinic will be dinghy-oriented. AYC Optis, Lasers, Sunfish and FJs will be available to clinic participants.

AYC will host a US Sailing Level 1 Instructor certification course taught by **Steve Gay** on two consecutive weekends - April 27-28 and May 4-5. This fantastic course teaches candidates the ins and outs of small boat sailing instruction. If you enjoy teaching and/or would like to get more involved in Sail Training activities at AYC, I highly recommend this course. Registration is available online through ussailing.org.

On Saturday, May 11, we will hold a new spring version of our popular Women's Clinic. This Mother's Day weekend event provides sailing instruction for women by women. It will include classroom and on-the-water instruction, lunch and an amazing dinner to wrap up the day.

Junior Training

Roadrunner sailing is finally here! We had a Pizza Party and Info Session on February 21 to kick off the season. There were about 60 Roadrunners, family, friends, and potential new members in attendance. Thank you to everyone who came out and especially to Roadrunner Social Chair, **Cheryl Butler**, for providing the pizza and drinks! At the Info Session, we highlighted some exciting new changes to the program:

- 1. Junior Sailing Season will be broken down into 3 shorter seasons:
 - Spring: March 8 May 25
- Summer: July 20 October 5
- Fall: October 11 November 16
- 2. This year, in addition to AYC membership dues, we are requiring an activity fee and optional equipment fee for participation in weekly practice sessions. Free Sail Sunday and other junior sailing social events will continue to be included in AYC membership. The fee structure for 2013:

Activity Fees (required for all participants)

- Season: \$50.00 per season
- Year: \$100.00 (sign up for all 3 seasons and receive \$50 off!)

Equipment Fee (required only for those participants who wish to use AYC boats during practice)

- Season: \$25.00 per season
- Year: \$50.00 (sign up for all 3 seasons and receive \$25 off!)
- 3. This year I will be using a rank system to standardize curriculum and track individual progress through the program. Each rank has several components, including Safety, Knots, Terminology and Concepts, Rigging, Sailing Skills, and Participation. Advanced ranks will also include Racing and Teaching requirements. All knowledge and skills will be taught during practice sessions. Sailors "pass" components of their ranks by completing classroom tests and/or physical demonstration.
- 4. In addition to any necessary membership paperwork, all junior sailors must have a completed Registration form, Medical Information and Release form, and a Participant and Parent Agreement on file. These forms, as well as the Parent and Participant Handbook, will be available on the AYC website soon. In the meantime, please contact me at kate@austinyachtclub.net or stop by the AYC office if you would like to sign up!

We will follow the same weekly practice schedule, starting on Friday, March 8:

- Beginners: Friday 4:00-6:30
- Opti Green Fleet: Saturday 1:30-4:00
- Laser/FJ: Saturday 4:00-6:30

Several of our junior sailors have gotten a head start on the season. This year we had a dinghy course for the Opening Day Regatta. Unfortunately, the conditions kept the FJ fleet off the water, but we did have four Opti competitors brave the wind. Congratulations to Ben Froelich, Ethan Froelich, Marcus Tita, and Jules Bettler! 



With the lake level so low, it appears that we will again need to pass on our turn to host the Region 4 Championship Regatta. My understanding is that Fleet 60 from Dillon, Colorado will step up and host the event this year. It's probably not too early to start daydreaming about the beautiful, cool, crisp Dillon air when it's likely to be 100+ degrees here in Central Tejas. We really should make a concerted effort to have a strong showing there since they have been kind enough to cover for us while we wait, and wait, and wait for rain.

Well, that's about all for now, except to say thanks to Elliot, Doug, Bill, Lewis, Randolph, Hap, Danny, Fred, and Jonathan for getting out there and racing throughout the past year. Frans, get your boat finished and back in the water where she belongs.

With the turnout at Frostbite and Opening day, the lake seems to be half full rather than half empty ... See you on the water!


Need a New Boat?
