Message from the Commodore by Russ Shermer



Greetings AYC Board and Membership,

Here is a summary of this year's events that were more or less under my purview:

In January we officially launched Clubspot to make many aspects of the Club easier for our members. Though most aspects of Club management are in Clubspot, the WordPress website still holds most of our website

content and some minor things like cabin reservations. Most members won't see a lot of the machinery that Clubspot provides, but should at least appreciate having full access to their payments, billing and user profile. It took a few months later to work through the scoring process so that all races ran smoothly. Later in the year, two hand-helds were added to accept credit card purchases by non-members at regattas, or to take credit card payments in the office. They were used to sell 18 books at the Will Sofrin presentation in September.

On March 5, the weather for the annual Opening Day Ceremony & Regatta was absolutely perfect. We kicked off the event with brunch and a Mimosas bar in the clubhouse. The Westlake Wine Bar donated all of the champagne for the event. The Sea Scouts kicked off the ceremony with the raising of the flag. Julian Rabago led us in the National Anthem. Hylton Cruikshank played the bagpipes for the ceremony. After welcoming everyone to the Club, I invited Steve **Digby** to give the invocation. After commemorating our lost members this year, Bill Records provided a very humorous history of the Club. We recognized the past commodores who were able to attend, the current Board of Directors and our staff members. After the ceremony closed, we had the skippers meeting for the regatta; the current Board of Directors served as the race committee. Weather was ideal for fun racing. Our social chair, Janis Livingston, prepared and served fajitas for the awards ceremony. I owe the event's success to the many volunteers and all of the staff for making the event a raging success.

On April 15 and 16, we had our Spring End of Series awards and dinner. **Janis Livingston** had both events very well organized and even had some of the food pre-made. PRC did a great job managing the race committees and handling all of the scoring in Clubspot.

In May we started setting up food trucks. We kept them on Saturdays so that all the fleets had an opportunity to enjoy the experience and also so that PB&J and the pool users would benefit.

Jill and I visited the Rush Creek Yacht Club in Rockwall, Texas in order to appreciate what they are doing as a Club. About this time we started the weekly commodore newsletter. Even now, I still cannot predict exactly which day you will receive it.

In July, the last Long Range Planning Committee town hall was held and the work to figure out how to take that knowledge forward began. I'd like to thank next year's commodore for working directly with LRPC and helping make that effort a great success.

By August, the Melges 15 fleet had around a dozen boats or boat purchase commitments. It was exciting to see such explosive growth of a fleet at the Club! This fleet appears to be filling a much-needed niche and will potentially attract a lot of new and younger members to the Club. Huge kudos to **Kirk and Janis Livingston** for driving that effort and building a new fleet.

We hired our new head coach, **Zach**, and our second groundskeeper, **Kyle**, in August. These guys have been awesome to work with!

On September 13, **Will Sofrin** retold the story of delivering a replica 18th century tall ship from Rhode Island to San Diego that was used as a prop for the movie "Master & Commander: The Far Side of the World." In the retelling, he shared photos and video of the journey through storms, a partial de-masting, and delivery of a ship that required months of repairs to become seaworthy again. It was both a humorous and a deeply heartfelt story that made for an absolutely wonderful evening. I would like to thank **Janis Livingston** for preparing the delicious hors d'oeuvres and supplying the beverages, and also **Ed & Colleen Taylor** for helping clean up.

On September 16, US Sailing in conjunction with the Storm Trysail Club, put on a Safety at Sea seminar that was absolutely brilliant. Participants could just show up and take the training for the day, or take the 15-hour online course ahead of time. The advantage of the pre-study was that you had the opportunity to deep-dive into all of the aspects of survival at sea with the online course, then get a refresher at the one-day seminar. The course also provided a great deal of handson training. This included getting to practice the proper use of a fire extinguisher to put out an actual fire, the use of flares, crew overboard exercises and experiencing an auto-inflate PFD. This is the first time the course has been offered in central Texas, but given how well it was received, I suspect we will be offering it again. Participants and instructors flew in from Florida, Rhode Island and Chicago. Michael Moran was the chair of this event and ran an absolutely flawless seminar. This one-day event also generated over \$6,000 of income after expenses.

In October, we made the executive decision to discontinue food trucks for the Fall Series. We were losing too much money subsidizing a service that the membership was not utilizing.

In the Annual Membership Meeting held on November 16, we approved the 2024 Board. I thoroughly enjoyed working with the outgoing 2023 Board members: Anne Morley, David Jamail, Jeff Sabuda, Kurt Carson, Linda McDavitt and Tom Groll. Thank you for your service!

How the Highland Lakes Got Its Name by John Howard

Recreation was not on the Lower Colorado River Authority's list of priorities in the 1930s when it was building the first of the dams that created a chain of lakes in the Central Texas Hill Country.

LCRA's focus was on building dams that would generate electricity, provide a reliable water

supply for the river basin and protect Austin and other downstream communities from the worst effects of Hill Country floods.

But as the lakes began to grow behind the dams, so did public interest in the lakes' recreational opportunities.

By 1940, cities, counties and the state parks board were acquiring land near the lakes to build parks and the roads that would lead to them. Boat docks were being built on the lakes. And LCRA's new general manager, Max Starcke, was receiving inquiries as to when the lakes would be open for boating, fishing and picnics.

The former mayor of Seguin, Starcke had come to LCRA in 1938 to organize its electric power program. As mayor of Seguin, he had transformed the town into a municipal showplace, with model electric and water utilities as well as parks and playgrounds.

Sensing a similar opportunity for LCRA, Starcke arranged to cosponsor a study by the state parks board and the National Park Service of the recreational potential of the lakes and surrounding region.

The report, issued in 1941, described what it considered a third major region in Texas ripe for recreational development. It would join the Big Bend region and the Gulf Coast as recreation magnets for a state with a population of 6 million that, as the report estimated, would grow to more than 8 million people by 1960.

The National Park Service considered the region to be "outstanding in its park and recreational possibilities," the report said.

The region offered "a vast potential recreational domain," given its central location in Texas, its unique geological features and vegetation and the four lakes created to date—Lake Buchanan, Inks Lake, the Marshall Ford Reservoir, later named Lake Travis, and Lake Austin. That created some 60,000 acres of water surface and more than 670 miles of shoreline.

The report envisioned a network of state and local parks along the lakes, supplemented by riding and hiking trails converted from old county and ranch roads that the lakes had rendered unusable for automobile.

The parks and other recreational sites would play host to a wide variety of activities. In addition to boating, sailing, fishing, camping and picnicking, the report envisioned such activities as "campfire lectures" – popular park features at the time- "lawn bowling," which had developed "widespread appeal among young and old alike"; outdoor concerts at amphitheaters, which the report predicted would be ideal for the region's climate; and polo fields and horse racing tracks, if the state legalized betting.

The sites would be connected by a 200-mile highway loop that would include a stretch of road to run atop the still-to-be-completed Marshall Ford Dam, late renamed Mansfield Dam.

For all its enthusiasm about the region, the report noted it had "some objectionable features." A federal program of cedar eradication had created "great scars of barrenness on the mountain" and "would soon nullify much of the region's desirability as a recreational area" unless stopped.

And the report cautioned that Lake Buchanan and Marshall Ford Reservoir, "designed as water-storage and flood control levels," would result in fluctuating lake elevations that would expose "great stretches of their respective lake beds."

"This fluctuation of water level precludes the possibility of and major recreational development on either lake shore that would function properly or with much success," the report warned, recommending lnks Lake and Lake Austin as the "most desirable for intensive recreational use," given their relatively "constant level."

To promote the recreational opportunities, the report suggested calling the region the "Highland Lakes," given its Hill Country locale and the 700-foot drop in elevation between lakes Buchanan and Austin, which the report noted was greater than the drop in altitude of the entire Mississippi River.

The report concluded: "That seemed the sufficient excuse to refer to them as the 'Highland Lakes."

The region thus was given a marketable name. But soon, the United States would enter World War II, putting Central Texas and the rest of the nation on a war footing-and precluding for several years any promotion of the region as the state's new "recreational domain."

Even so, the first steps had been taken to promote what would become known as the Highland Lakes region.

"LCRA is proud of the many benefits its dams and lakes have provided through the decades," Current LCRA General Manager Tom Mason said. "In addition to the main benefits of electricity, a reliable water supply and the protection from floods, the Highland Lakes and dams have added immeasurably to the beauty and quality of life of Central Texas."

Part 6

Let me start out by saying that happiness is a fresh, clean bottom. \bigcirc At least one key to happiness....

So, after getting the boat back to the marina, it was time to head back to Austin to plan my return to Seattle on the motorcycle. One thing I

discovered in flying back and forth is that Alaska Airlines has multiple direct flights between Austin and Seattle daily. And I can use my American Airlines miles to fly with them!! Heck, I even got upgraded a couple times.

After getting the 40,000-mile service done on my Harley and arranging to have my pups taken care of, I headed off. I made it to Tucson, Arizona the first day, then headed up to Lake Havasu City to visit my cousin. Had a nice visit and got to meet her son and two grandkids. They even took me out on Lake Havasu on their boat and cruised under the London Bridge. It sure was nice seeing a full lake!!

After leaving there, I headed up past Las Vegas to Twin Falls, Idaho, the place where Evel Knievel failed to jump the canyon in his rocket bike (due to a malfunction). Eddie Braun later made the jump with a rocket bike built from the plans used to build Evel's bike. One of these days I will make it over to see the Falls, but it is pretty cool watching people base jump off the bridge.

From there, it's a pretty easy ride to the Bremerton Marina. I even made it in before full dark. Man, it was nice to be back on the boat. Time now to plan to go hang out at one of the parks. Part of the planning is figuring out how much and what kind of food to bring on board. That's not too difficult when you are only going to be on the hook for three days at a time. Three days because that is the number of consecutive days you are limited to at the state parks, and my goal was to see how the solar panels and wind generator would keep the house batteries up.

As I was on the motorcycle, I was a bit limited in how much I could pick up in the way of groceries. I was able to pack enough in to last me a while. Keep in mind that when I'm in the marina, I can use the microwave and electric coffee maker with no problem. On the hook, that involves running the 12-volt house bank through the inverter. Since I was trying to see how the house batteries would hold up, I wanted to minimize the electric usage. So, gas stove/oven or gas grill for most meals.

Overall, the results were decent. I expect that without the wind and solar I would have had to run the engine every day. As it was, I could go a little over two days now. Good deal!! And this is in autumn, when the sun is rather low and the solar isn't the most efficient. Heck, I'm at like 48 degrees north, more than half the way to the North Pole.

I did make two trips over to the Blake Island State Park on this trip. I even ended up grabbing the same mooring ball both times. Wow, there are some really cool hiking trails on the island! Toward the end of my second stay, I realized that I had an app that I could use to track my hikes. I have one hike saved from my last visit, so I guess I need to make more trips over. There is a marina on the island with a pump out station, but it is a bit tight for a long keel boat.

In the process of grabbing the mooring both times it struck me that I may need to expand my tutoring. I work with people on the things

to think about when approaching a mooring, or anchorage. Such as, which side do you want to approach? Where do you go if you miss and have to go around? Should you pick up the mooring from the bow or the stern? But now I have a center cockpit boat with a rather high freeboard. Trust me, that changes the dynamics.

On the first trip over to the island, there wasn't much wind but about a two-knot current. I nosed up to the mooring ball, put the engine in neutral, and went forward to grab the mooring. That is when I found out how heavy the mooring chain is and how heavy a 30,000-pound boat is in a two-knot current. Since I was picking up the mooring on the bow and I have about a five-foot freeboard on the bow, I failed at the first attempt.

The second time around I gave the boat a bit more momentum into the current before I put the boat into neutral and headed forward. This time I was able to manhandle the mooring and get a line through the eye. Dang, but that chain is heavy. I rested for a bit then rigged a second line. Since it was raining at the time, I decided to call in to register rather than take the dinghy ashore. Now I do have an annual state park moorage permit, but there is a convenience fee for checking in by phone ...

One of the things I did discover on this trip was that the outboard motor on my dinghy wouldn't idle, again. Use your imagination to think of the bad words I used. Shall we say that this trip alerted me to the fact that the outboard didn't idle well, and the linkage to tilt it up was broken (that means you can't really beach the dinghy with the outboard on). Oh, well.

So, the second trip over to Blake Island had a bit more wind, at least at the end. I cruised over, and once I got through the Rich Passage, the wind picked up. I sailed around a while, then headed in to pick up a mooring. This time, with wind and current, it was a bit more challenging. And I had an audience!! There were several other boats on moorings this time around. It seemed like whenever I got close, something was against me. Either the wind or the current would drive me off. Finally, I was able to grab the mooring, about amidships this time. And like I said, I had witnesses.

When I caught up with them on shore, I expressed that I hoped I had provided enough entertainment. Once they realized I was single-handed, it was more 'holy crap, you did that alone?"

After that I was entertained by other yachts coming in to grab a mooring. Downwind, crosswind, whatever. It didn't seem like they were paying attention to their surroundings. I guess those folks should have come to some of my tutoring sessions!! Though I do think I'll need to expand on some topics due to the lessons I'm learning around Seattle.

As some of you are aware, one of the topics I cover heavily is slow speed maneuvering using prop walk and prop wash. This is extremely useful, and actually impressive. One day I had taken the boat out and as there was a light breeze, I thought it was a good time to practice prop walk to see how the wind would affect it. I played around with it for a while, getting the feel. I found it didn't take much breeze against the bow to cancel the force of the prop walk, but if I got some momentum turning with prop wash the prop walk could readily help the pivot continue. Good to know.

Once I got back to the dock, I found out one of my dock neighbors was watching me and remarked that he saw me out there 'casting about'. Hmmm, that was a term I had never heard, but he assured me that maneuvering like that with prop walk and wash was called 'casting about'. I will say it is a useful tool in general, but absolutely essential for a long keel boat. But the next time I was coming back into the dock from a sail, I had two of my dock neighbors waiting to help me dock. I came around the end of the dock and came up to my slip. I stopped the boat and proceeded to 'cast about' to line the boat up with the slip and then proceed in. Once tied up, one of the guys asked me if I had a bow thruster on my boat. When I said no, he replied that I was 'damn impressive'. Nice complement from a retired Navy captain!!

The ride back to Texas was nice in that I didn't have any snow. I did get to see the start of the fall colors in the mountains with red, yellow, and orange in patches. I did have to ride through rain from when I filled up in Twin Falls until I had to fill up again, like 250 miles. It then started raining again south of Price, Utah on the way to Moab, and it had the audacity to actually hail on me. Pea to marble size!! Good thing I was well covered. The weird thing was the temperature never topped 70 until I crossed into Texas. It went up six degrees in the first 10 miles and was well over 80 by the time I got to Lubbock. I guess there still was a heat dome over Texas. At least it wasn't the 105 degrees I had on the ride up.

So, I'm back in Texas taking care of things for a bit. Sometime in December or January I'll be heading back up to Bremerton and the Twisted Journey. The next trip up will be to sail up to the San Juan Islands for 2 – 3 weeks. If you would like to come out and play, either on my Hunter on what's left of Lake Travis, or on the Twisted Journey, let me know.

SORC St. Pete to Lauderdale by Chris & Karen Lewis



AYC Members Take 1st Overall in the 1st Running of SORC's St. Petersburg to Fort Lauderdale Race in 33 Years!

The dream of running this race again, and Storm Trysail Club building offshore events in the Gulf of Mexico, was finally realized on November 8 when 20 yachts took off from Tampa Bay and out through the Skyway Bridge to test their speed and tactical skills over the storied St. Petersburg to Lauderdale race course.



Conditions were benign with a forecast of building breeze to 12-18 knots that would veer from NW to SE throughout the race. Initially a light VMG run and narrow wind bands led to a restart at the

Skyway Bridge as the fleet raced to the SW entrance buoy, switching to code sails and then jibs. Back to VMG running for 100 miles before the final 70-mile stretch to Rebecca Shoal that became a power reach as the forecasted wind build and rotation played out.

The lighter displacement boats with their large A-kites initially lead their ORC classes at the turning mark as the final and most tactical section of the race began. Some yachts tacked inshore avoiding the Gulf Stream's counter current. Others extended on port for 15 to 20 miles in order to pick up the edge of the stream. However, the wind oscillated and created tricky calls for navigators. Do you go for current or work the shifts? Ultimately a balance between the two options worked best for the Class Winners.

As the course turned northwards along the keys; faster offshore positions in the stream were rotated back as compared with the inshore competitors sailing less distance. Sail options also played a role as the earlier one could get to a code sail and then an A3 the quicker you became.

After turning at the Port Everglades, RW buoy finishers reported their times at G3 marker and the wait began to see who was going to win the LL "Lew" McMasters Memorial Trophy and have their name and boat engraved alongside the sailing greats of the 60s, 70s and 80s.

First to finish and winner of the Commodore Robert B. Lassing Memorial Trophy was Privateer the Cookson 50 sailed by Ron O'Hanley. ORC1 Class winner and 7th in the ORC fleet was Chris Saxton sailing Vortices, a J125. The ORC1 class, first around Rebecca Shoal faced left breeze and a pure upwind to the Key West RW buoy, where as the slower boats were able to sail less distance.

Texas based boats Kenai sailed by Chris and Karen Lewis with Taylor Snyder on board and Bear sailed by Forbes Durdin with Lakewood member Even Smith on board after a long duel finished 1st and 2nd in ORC2 and in the ORC Fleet. ORC3 winner Zig Zag and current holder of the SORC Islands in the Stream Series took 3rd in fleet.

The PHRF fleet enjoyed a third night offshore and brought in the final finisher Freedom of Hamble with a 3 day 18 min elapsed time. The fleet winner in PHRF was Petisa a Salona 44 sailed by Harold Brandon.

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
