

The Board has pulled together the budget for 2024 and approved it at the February Board

Meeting. It has a couple of tough assumptions, but does not require much of an increase in dues or docks beyond keeping up with inflation. Harbor Commander Report by Mike Beuerlein



In the past, month there has been some progress made toward the Harbor Committee's goals for the year.

The Harbor Committee met in mid-February to:

- · Document the numerous locations on each of the docks where perimeter boards and rub rails have degraded with time, come loose and/or dislodged to assist in getting the proper materials for repair. The work party was encouraged to make such repairs if they had the proper tools and materials in coordination with those with prior experience in these kinds of repairs on the Harbor Committee.
- · Investigate the current bridge situation to the Junior dock where incompatible design has led to some amount of dock and/or bridge damage to assist in getting the proper replacement bridge.
- Determine current completion status of junior dock and pavilion capital expenditure projects.

Since there is currently a waiting list for wet slips and yet several dry storage slots available at AYC:

- Conduct a thorough inventory of both the wet & dry storage areas to identify:
 - » Appropriate wet slips currently assignable to those on waiting list.
 - » Unused wet slip boats which may be candidates for dry sail area storage.

April Work Party/Planning Session

The Harbor Committee was unable to complete all of our desired activities in mid-February, specifically:

- Non-member boats stored in member slots or common areas.
- Vacant or under-utilized DSA slots in highly desirable locations.
- DSA owners whose boats are impinging on their neighbors' space.
- Irreparable boats which may be candidates for removal or, at least, relocation to the boneyard so as to maximize access for actively raced sailboats and minimize unmonetized storage capacity.

All of this is with the goal of more efficient allocation of oversized/ under-sized storage slots with possible fee adjustment to reflect more equitable cost per square footage, possible fee adjustment for non-sailboats, possible monetization of unpaved, unused trailer storage space (the "Boneyard").

Dock Improvements

A second work party is scheduled for April 27th to be headed up by **Bob Leonard and Harry Polly**. The party will start at 9:00am and will go on until 1:00pm. The goal for the work party is to repair/replace broken perimeter boards and rubber bumpers as needed. Please let the Harbor Committee know if you are available to assist with this task.

Dry Sail Area

We continue to analyze the dry slip area to determine if re-striping to reflect the various boat/trailer widths more closely would improve dry slip management. The idea is to create narrower slips for board boats and wider slips for the larger boats, such as catamarans and trimarans. We would also propose to re-assign slips based on boat usage so that those boats that are being frequently moved in and out of dry sail can do so more easily. Those boats that are being stored and unused will be moved to the back of dry sail and out of the more easily accessible slips.

Dry Out & Workspace Area Useage

We are considering imposing a fee for the dry out and workspace area, which is currently free. Use of the dry out and workspace areas will remain free for the currently allotted time frames for each (30 days for dry out, 3 weeks for workspace, and 3 days for the hoist). The fees would be imposed on those who abuse our system by remaining in the dry out area for prolonged periods of time, storing non-member boats in the dry out area, and continually requesting workspace storage for prolonged periods of time. Once we reach agreement on a policy to this end, a motion will be presented for consideration.

Race Commander Report by Terry Schertz



PRC

The Permanent Race Committee for 2024 has 10 members, half are returning and half are new this year. The team is **Kurt Carson**, **Bob Leonard**, **Hazel Sanchez**, **Jim Rehage**, **Jorge Martínde-Nicolás**, **Rick Smith**, **Michael Moran**, **Alan Stanard**, **Jessie Yost**, and **John Rains**.

RC Training

The team has focused a lot of energy early this year on developing training modules to help members build their skills in race management. 19 individuals have taken one or more of the five training modules the PRC has offered on Saturdays during the Frostbite Series. The PRC intends to offer Race Management training throughout the year, but will take some time to evaluate how well this initial push worked before crafting a new plan.

Fleets

To help with both better competition and more people to draw from for race committee duty, we worked with a few of the fleets that had very light participation in recent years to combine them. PHRF A and PHRF B have combined into one start. They will do RC together, but continue to be scored separately. Three fleets, the J22, J70, and J24, were combined into one start and will compete as one fleet (PHRF). These fleets had always raced round the buoys instead of long distance, so we made this PHRF fleet RTB. We now have six starts with seven fleets (Multihulls, PRF-A and PRF-B, Pearson 26, J80, J-PRF, and Ensign) and are hoping they are set up to have some good racing!

Series

We are set to have four series in 2024, each with seven race weekends. A bit longer series gives us a better chance at getting enough races in to make the competition interesting! Given the number of weekends that have been cancelled in the Frostbite Series so far, it's been a good choice. We chose not to have a Dog Days Series and leave that late summer time open for whatever sounds fun – fleet driven activities, on the water training, raft ups, etc.

Single Day Series Racing

After consulting with the fleets and evaluating the pros and cons of split race days vs all fleets racing on one day, the decision has been made to return to a single day. Given the lake level, the variety of fleets and race course needs, and the smaller number of classes (starts) to field race management, there was no perfect solution. But five out of six fleets voted for sailing together. The calendar has been corrected to show only one day for Series races (Sunday for the Spring and Fall series, Saturday for the Summer series).

It's been a busy start to the 2024 season for the PRC and me. We're doing everything we can to set AYC for a good racing season. Now, if we could just get some water....!

Building & Grounds Commander Report by Lewis Price



Hello fellow AYC members, I'd like to introduce myself. I'm **Lewis Price**, long time AYC member, and the new Building & Grounds Commander. I basically grew up at AYC and have been racing my family's Ensign, Dos Locos, for a long time. I'm excited to serve in this role and help my longtime friend, **Bill Hawk**, as he takes over as Commodore.

Some of the major initiatives I would like to see accomplished in 2024 include an upgrade to the antiquated waterline system by replacing the old lines with new 2" PVC and adding additional control valves for a more efficiently operating system.

The children's playscape is in dire need of safety improvements, including a new plastic liner to replace the old railroad ties. Bids to do so have already been received and upon Board approval, work will hopefully be getting underway shortly.

The control system for the front gate is in need of replacement and we are working with the manufacturer to install a new one that meets our needs as a Club.

Like previous B&G commanders, I will be organizing a few workdays to help our Club continue to look nice throughout the year. Remember, one of this Club's founding principles is volunteerism, and these workdays are a great way for probationary members to get in their required hours. I plan on having the first one sometime in April after the initial spring growth and the oak trees have gone through their new leaf cycle.

I also plan on making an effort to replace some of the trees we either lost to oak wilt or the major ice storm we had last winter.

I'm looking for volunteers to serve on my B&G standing committee, so let me know if you are interested in helping me. One member who has already done so is **Owen Crouse**. In fact, he is currently organizing a work party to clean up some of the shrubs and overgrowth along Beacon Drive approaching the Club entrance. During the months of January and February, our Junior Sail Training Programs have been actively engaging our Opti 2, Opti 3, ILCA Racing Team, and High School sailors in onwater activities.

Opti 2, Opti 3, and ILCA sailors have been hard at work honing their skills in preparation for TSA

competition and our upcoming Roadrunner Regatta. The Roadrunner

is the inaugural event on the TSA calendar and will be hosted right here at the Austin Yacht Club on March 23-24.

Our High School Sailing
Team has dedicated the
winter months to mastering
Team Racing, alternating
between team racing and
fleet racing practice. As
we move into the Spring
Season, we will actively
push to team race more
and prepare for High School
ISSA events.



Spring and Summer Registrations are Open

Given the large size of our incoming Opti 2 class, all Club-owned boats will be in use this spring season. We are encouraging families to consider purchasing their own boats to avoid waitlists. Some members have Optis for sale that their children have outgrown. If you are interested, please reach out to me, and we will help you find a boat.

Changes to our Spring Program

We have restructured the High School Team into three classes (A team, B team, Middle/High School: Introduction to Sailing) versus the usual two. This will allow for a more competitive B team and encourage new sailors to join us at AYC in Middle/High School without needing prior sailing experience. As a result, the Single/Double Handed class has been retired to accommodate these changes. HS/Middle School Intro to Sailing will combine with B team sailors on Saturday mornings, offering plenty of opportunities to pair up and enjoy time on the water.

Learn to Sail Programs

If your son or daughter would like to start sailing in our Junior Program, register them in one of our Learn to Sail Programs. These classes are taught in either Optis 8-12 years old or E420s 12-18 years old. Registration can be found on the AYC website under Youth Sailing.

For Opti, ILCA, and High School Sailors the spring regatta schedule has been finalized and posted on the AYC calendar. Emily Verdoia: Inspiring Girls Through Coaching

When Emily Verdoia joined the University of Texas at Austin's sailing team, she didn't expect to end up as the Youth Sailing Lead Instructor and Office Manager at the St. Thomas Sailing Center in the Virgin Islands. Her love for sailing was reignited after a childhood as a competitive snowboarder when she joined the UT team, later becoming a US Sailing Certified Instructor at the Austin Yacht Club before moving to the Virgin Islands and the St. Thomas Sailing Center. Emily never had a female coach as a young sailor, so she became one, working to help young women and girls take up all the space they need to excel.

US Sailing chatted with Emily in honor of National Day of Girls and Women in Sports about her college sailing experience, a day in the life at St. Thomas, and why it's never too late to become a sailor.

Emily rediscovered her love for sailing later in life, starting as a child but taking a hiatus that lasted until she went to college and joined the University of Texas at Austin Sailing Team. Her father was a sailor, but childhood camps didn't stick, because sailing Optis in the San Francisco Bay was, in Emily's words, "terrifying and miserable."

Emily enjoyed sailing with her father on his keelboat, though, and took those good memories with her when she joined the UT team. It was important to her that she chose sailing herself, without any outside influence or encouragement. "We weren't the best in the country, by any means," she said of her team, "but it was great competition within our conference and a lot of fun. And I met some friends that I'm going to have for the rest of my life."

While in college, Emily began working at the Austin Yacht Club. She already had her Level 1 US Sailing Certification, so she started by covering their beginner Opti programs on the weekends. When Emily graduated in 2020, the club let her know that they needed a more full-time coach, and eventually, she worked her way up to become Director of the youth program. The unique circumstances of the year set her on a path she didn't expect.

"I don't want to say it fell into my lap," she said, "but it wasn't something that I necessarily thought out." She remembers being a young sailor and never having a female coach, so while she worked with a high school team in Austin, she encouraged all the girls to get their Level 1 Certifications and become camp counselors. "When you see more women coaching and you see that it can be done really well by a woman, I think that helps inspire young girls." Emily's not just a role

model; she's using her firsthand experience to personally help other young women follow her path.

Less than a year ago, Emily moved from Austin to the Virgin Islands, and now works at the St. Thomas Sailing Center coaching Opti Green Fleet. She wants her students not only to know how to sail, but to know how to advocate for themselves, and she's become the female role model she never had. She's found that many women are pigeonholed into working the bow due to their smaller stature, so she makes sure all her kids know they belong wherever they want to be.

Emily's experience as an underrepresented sailor means she can truly relate to and bond with the kids she coaches. "Trust me," she tells them, "and trust that you're better than you think you are."

Emily's message to other women and girls who want to get involved with sailing or coaching is to find and connect with a supportive community. "Push through any discomfort," she said, "and find people who uplift you. Whether that's other women, a mentor, a peer; maybe it's a youth sailor you coach who just thinks that you're the bee's knees – find those people. Hold on to those people, and work together to uplift each other."





The waves were still pretty large offshore, and they were even 3-5 foot breaking on the shore, which ended up knocking me down both at the start of the swim and when I came back in. At least it wasn't rocky where I did the face plants.

We kept hoping for good weather, but in general it was cloudy, misty, and sometimes rainy. That didn't stop us from exploring the different beaches and such, though our water activities were pretty much limited to wading. Christmas in the Bahamas ...

32 Seconds from Glory by Chris & Karen Lewis



AYC Members Chris Lewis, Taylor Snyder and Thomas Young have been competing in the SORC Islands in the Stream Series. The final race of four events was from Fort Lauderdale to Key West, formerly referred to as the 'Feeder' to Key West Race Week.

The Lewis' J/44 Kenai had had an

erratic series with 1st & 10th and a 10th as a throw out and was lying 5th overall. Our goal was re-focused to a race win which is always tough to do in a large ORC rated fleet with boats ranging from a Hobie 31 to an RP68.

The race started downwind with VMG running using the 0.5oz kite to Miami Sea Buoy. Picking the shifts and staying in pressure, Kenai managed to hang with the most competitive lighter boats in our class, including J/122 Zig Zag and Farr 39 Senara. After Miami the stretch to Fowey Rock turned into a light upwind against the edge of the Gulf Stream. With the wind rotating forwards and building a little, Kenai took a hitch offshore and picked up better new breeze and took the lead in her Class.

The course then takes the fleet around the Keys offshore between the reef and the Gulf Stream that builds offshore to 3 knots against you. 50 miles later the wind shut off in the night and our navigator, who was checking onshore observations, realized that a NW land breeze off the Everglades was going to fill in. We readied the Code Zero and unfurled

it as the new breeze filled in our starboard side. The faster Class 2 boats around us were not as well prepared and we over took four faster boats in the next 30 minutes!

However, as we peeled to the 0.5oz kite the faster boats ran over us as the wind shut-off again and left us drifting. Gybing offshore to anticipate the gradient breeze filling in again we lost 100 yards and so decided to follow the pack. However, our main rival, Zig Zag, managed to soak below us and picked up a 10 knot fill of the SW prevailing breeze before us. Our advantage on them that had been as much as 6 miles evaporated, and they jumped us as we struggled to douse the wind seeker in 10 knots (and doing 7 knots!) and get onto the 145% genoa.

Then came the drag race with Code Zeros or a heavy #1 on the rail, and our speed in breeze took us back into a leading position on the water. Turning around the Key West Sea buoy we hoisted the A2 and Spinnaker Staysail and charged for 6 miles up the channel to finish off the Naval Basin. The sun was out and the water crystal clear. But we knew that Zig Zag may correct ahead of us. After a long wait as the SORC RC consulted Dobbs Davis, head of the US ORC ratings organization, the results were published. Dobbs had created a custom rating for the crazy wind conditions by reviewing Expedition data files from several competitors and Zig Zag corrected to 1st overall by 31 seconds from Kenai in a 26 hr 10 min race!

We had pulled ourselves up to 2nd in the series and were awarded first yacht over 25 yrs. old and first Storm Trysail Member.

Ed. After 10 years of East Coast sailing Chris & Karen are bringing Kenai home to Lakewood YC in May and will sail locally. They plan to compete in the Harvest Moon Race again and return to Tampa Bay for the 2024-25 SORC series.
