

## What's Wrong With Sailboat Racing And How To Fix It

The national and local sailboat racing sport is sick and in danger of dying. Nationally the lay public associates it with the America's Cup, a ridiculous venue that is too expensive even for individual millionaires. The other racing events featured in the sail magazines (but ignored by the press) are mostly sailed offshore in boats that only the very wealthy can afford. In recent years the population of the Austin area has more than doubled while participation in our sport at AYC continues to decline. Looking back to the early 1980's, I remember being on the starting line with 18-22 boats in PHRF C class week after week. Now, the most popular PHRF class is non-spinnaker D and it seldom has more than eight boats on the line for series races. I love to race sailboats and want to see this situation turned around.

Several years ago I wrote an article for the AYC Telltale entitled "The Best Sailors Race Non-Spinnaker or How To Get More Racers To Come Out and Play". In it I suggested that part of the reason for the decline is that many people no longer have the time to practice, or to recruit and train crews. However, the growing popularity of golf flies in the face of the "not enough time" theory. Playing golf takes a lot of time, comparable to sailboat racing. Both golf and sailing offer beautiful scenery and an opportunity for fellowship. But golf also offers everyone a chance to feel competitive; sailboat racing offers that only to a few: pros and those endowed with exceptional talent and/or time to practice.

Think how silly it would be if a golfer's handicap was based on the clubs in his bag! Who would play golf, other than pros on the club manufacturers' payroll? And that is exactly what we are doing when we base the sailboat racer's handicap on the boat. No, the golfer's handicap is not based on his 8-iron; it is based on his current level of expertise in the sport. Whenever he exceeds that level he feels rewarded.

Added to the folly of handicapping the boat instead of the sailor, we handicap the boats unfairly. We allow PHRF numbers to be changed by committees made up of competitors in the same class. And, the system doesn't recognize that supposedly "identical" boats can be quite different. My wife and I used to regularly win C class events in a Pearson 26 that was clearly much faster than the other three "identical" boats racing at the time. One-design advocates claim that their venue is the ultimate answer. But their numbers are not growing significantly, and one-design racing leaves out the majority of sailors, who do not own a class boat. I raced Thistles and Sunfish for several years in Florida with some success but did not enjoy the pressure to always

have the newest sails and the lightest boat. I noticed that only a few novices in these classes stick with it long enough to become competitive.

In the previous Telltale article I called for a large nonspinnaker bonus to be added to PHRF handicap ratings. This would make it more fun (competitive) for both novice and experienced non-spinnaker sailors in the established A, B, and C classes. However, I am now convinced that, although this might help a little, much more radical changes must be made to the rules of our

sport in order to save it. The changes have to be in a direction that will reward every racing sailor with the feeling that he is competitive when gauged against a realistic yardstick.

We need to implement a radically new and different handicap system, based on the sailor's recent performance. Some incremental changes in this direction have been successfully made at other locations (see the

excerpts below from an article in American Sailor), but we need something more

radical. The suggestion to add time to individual sailor's PHRF ratings was investigated here at AYC a few years ago. Records were kept to see how much allowance would be required to make the slowest sailors competitive. The results were surprising - in some cases 50 seconds per mile and more! So the attitude was "We can't do that, it's impractical". But why not? The results simply illustrate how discouraging the current system can be. Let's implement a multiplier factor M > 1 to modify a basic PHRF rating instead of an added time bonus. Let the people in their first series write their own handicaps. Suggest to novices that they start out with M = 1.5. Adjust the factor at the end of each series (or maybe every six months) to a number that makes them even with the first place winner. The non-spinnaker controversy would vanish under this system. Sailors would simply declare what equipment they plan to use and would be required to stay with it, or start a new data set.

This of course will not be popular with the small number of influential people who have some kind of stake (financial or ego) in keeping our sport the way it is now. But the way it is now is killing it. Tradition has always been strong in sailing, but the time for change is here. If it works, if it turns out to be popular, the "powers that be" will adopt it and say it was their idea all along.

Up and down the coast, competitors were either dropping out of racing entirely or forming golf handicapping groups. PHRF in our area was quite competitive and a number of boat owners were either unable or unwilling to match the level of expertise of these boats. Initially, this desertion was viewed with alarm by the Board of Handicappers... market competition! --- However, in time it has proven to be in our best interest to help form these golf handicapping fleets.

PHRF-SEF (Southeast Florida) helped initially in rating the boats utilizing our techniques, then a constant was added to the rating. This initial rating was then adjusted downward for the winners after each race" utilizing a percentage of corrected time differences. The underlying thought was that if the rating got back to the PHRF number, the sailor might consider moving to a regular PHRF fleet. The particulars of the golf handicapping system have changed somewhat under different administrators but the basic concepts have remained... move the winners down over time until every one has a shot at the trophies.

The objectives have been realized, boats have moved between regular PHRF and golf handicapping, and most rewarding... the golf fleet is having fun!

## Junior Summer Day Camp

The goal of the AYC Summer Junior Camp program is to teach juniors how to sail, in such a way that they enjoy sailing and feel safe and comfortable on boats and around the lake.

The yacht club has run an organized junior sailing camp in the summer for about ten years. This year the camp will be a day camp running from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. We will have early and late supervision so you may drop off as early as 8:00 AM and pick up until 6:00 PM. Breakfast (generally cereal and juice) and lunch (sandwich and fruit or a prepared meal) are included in the registration fee.

The junior sailing camp will run for four separate one-week (Monday-Friday) sessions in June. The camp will focus on beginning and intermediate instruction. The boats used are Sunfish and Optimist Dinghies, which is included in the cost of camp. I f your child will be bringing their own Sunfish or Optimist, please deduct \$50.00 from the cost of camp. Even if you are bringing your own boat, you will need to have a \$250.00 refundable damage deposit submitted to AYC due to damage that can occur between boats.

The camp is limited to 23 juniors (age 8 through 14) in each session. The spaces will be filled on a first come first served basis, so early registration is recommended.

There is a required swim test for all campers. The swim test is administered at the yacht club at 4:00 PM the Sunday afternoon prior to the Monday that camp begins. The swim test consists of swimming approximately 50 yards in sailing clothes and shoes plus treading water for 2 minutes. If you have a question whether your son or daughter can pass the swimming test, please call me and we can set up an earlier date. Each camper must pass the swim test before the start of camp in order to attend camp.
