The drought of 1999/2000 has now claimed two AYC casualties. A fall iunior clinic that had been scheduled to start September 24 has been cancelled because the training dock. where the boats are stored, is grounded and somewhat hazardous to walk on. As had been announced in previous Telltales, plans were being made for a high profile charity regatta to be held at the AYC in late November. Unfortunately the Lone Star Cup Charity Regatta has now also been canceled because of uncertainties about participation caused by the low lake level. The current level of Lake Travis is slightly under 644' and is projected, by the LCRA to continue to drop at a rate of about 2' per month. The north cove ramp is still usable, but should be used with caution as we

looking forward to working out at the lake. Please take the time to welcome Vic to the AYC.

Night Race Notice of Regatta September 16, 2000 For information, call 266-1336

You are cordially invited to participate in the 2000 Night Race hosted by the Austin Yacht Club on beautiful Lake Travis in Austin, Texas.

Date: Saturday, September 16, 2000.

Event: A one-evening, one-race regatta open to monohull keel boats, cruising multihull boats, and

trimarans. All boats will sail a course defined at the Skippers' meeting. The start/finish line will be between the two No Wake buoys at the mouth of the cove. Approximate 16 mile course comprised of AYC permanent marks. The course, including approximate latitude and longitude of marks will be posted by noon the day of the race. One race will constitute the re-

gatta.

Format: The format will be a reverse handicap start, those boats with a PHRF handicap of 300 start-

ing first and the fastest boats starting last. The official starting times for all PHRF numbers will be posted during the Skippers' meeting. The PHRF of Lake Travis Handicap Rating System will be used. Any boat without a rating can receive one at registration. All boats sailing non-spinnaker will sail with a rating 12 seconds/mile slower than its assigned PHRF rating.

Entry Fee: \$20.00/boat, less \$5.00 US Sailing Membership Discount

Scoring & Trophies: First boat across the finish line will be declared the winner; subsequent places being awarded

to subsequent boats. Trophies will be awarded to spinnaker and non spinnaker fleets based

on the total number of boats entered in the regatta.

Rules & Equipment: This regatta will be governed by the current Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS), the prescriptions

of the United States Sailing Association (US SAILING), the rules of each class concerned (except as any of these are altered by the regatta sailing instructions), by the regatta sailing instructions, and by the Coast Guard and State Safety Regulations. Sailing instructions will be available during registration. All boats will be required to have properly working lights. Registration will not be accepted for boats without identical numbers on their mainsails and

spinnakers.

Facilities: There are limited campsites available on the AYC grounds. Showers and restrooms are

available to all regatta participants and guests. Some cabins and screened shelters are available for rent. Please contact the AYC office at 266-1336 for cabin rentals. Pets and fire-

works are strictly prohibited on AYC grounds.

Despite the low lake level, there are numerous opportunities to enjoy sailboat racing at AYC. As we head for the cooler temperatures of fall (and hopefully some rain), here are several ways to the clear, clean waters of beautiful Lake Travis.

Governor's Cup

Preparations are in full swing for the Governor's Cup regatta on October 7 and 8. The regatta will not only be an opportunity to race but will also be a great opportunity to gather and enjoy the club. Separate courses will be provided for monohull centerboard and keelboats, trimarans and beach catamarans. Free food, beer and other liquid refreshments will be available Friday evening and Sunday afternoon. A BBQ dinner and dancing to live music are for Saturday evening. If you can't get your boat in the water, there are always people looking for crew or perhaps you and your crew could borrow a boat that wouldn't otherwise sail. Even if you can't sail, come on out an be part of the shore side fun or help the RC one or both days. There are lots of ways to enjoy the lake no matter the level!

AYC Team Championships

This year, the club team championships will be sailed in Ensigns on September 30 and October 1 (if necessary). Teams of four AYC members will sail. The entry deadline will be September 27 at 5:00 PM. Please talk to your fleet members or put together an independent team and come on out. There are a lot of good sailors at AYC so this is great opportunity for a fun, competitive regatta.

The Single-handed Championship will follow the same format that has been used for the past several years with championships awarded to Sunfish and Laser sailors that compile the best score during the month of September. Throw outs

will be in accordance with the ISAF criteria. Separate awards will be made for male and female sailors. There must be at least three competitors in order for an award to be made.

The Junior Championship will be determined with a regatta later this fall. The details will be made available when they are finalized.

Night Race

The night race will be held on Sept. 16. The race committee is planning to use reverse handicap starts beginning at 7:00 pm, similar to the Friday night format. Because of the low lake level, the course will use permanent marks near AYC and be posted by noon the day of the race. Also, the RC will have chase boats stationed near low water areas to warn boats that are getting too close. Festivities including refreshments before the race as well as breakfast tacos afterward are planned.

Governor's Cup 2000 Regatta

You are cordially invited to participate in the Governor's Cup 2000 Regatta hosted by the Austin Yacht Club on beautiful Lake Travis in Austin, Texas. This is the 49th event in a long history of Governor's Cup Regattas.

Dates:

Saturday and Sunday, October 7 and 8, 2000.

Event

A two-day, three-race to six-race regatta open to monohull keel boats, centerboard boats, multihull boats, and trimarans. On both days, all boats will race in the basin of Lake Travis. Temporary marks and/or AYC permanent marks will be used. One race will constitute a regatta.

Classes:

For one-design fleets a minimum of five boats will constitute a class. Classes may be divided into spinnaker and non-spinnaker classes. Keel handicap classes will use the PHRF of Lake Travis handicap rating system. The Portsmouth Yardstick will be used to establish centerboard handicap classes.

PHRF Handicap Certificate:

Measurement is not required, but each boat racing in any PHRF handicap class must have a PHRF Handicap Certificate on file with AYC or must complete one at skipper check-in. A boat without a PHRF Handicap Certificate on file will not be scored.

Scoring:

The Low Point Scoring System described in Appendix A of the current Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS), except as modified by the sailing instructions, will be used.

History of Governor's Cup

The concept for the Governor's Cup Regatta was formed during a drive back from a regatta at the Fort Worth Boat Club. AYC was struggling to get started and we wanted to do something to attract attention and members. Francis McIntyre had just returned from a vacation in Jamaica and crewed in a race at the Royal Jamaican Yacht Club. The "Royal" was used if the Queen was an honorary member. This gave McIntyr the idea of having the Governor of Texas made an honorary member and calling the regatta The Governor's Cup.

Mary McIntyre and Sue McBee found the cup in a junk shop on Red River. It had a broken shaft, a hole in the bowl and the feet of the goddess were missing. It was restored to its present condition by a silver repair shop on East 6th Street. The cup was given to the out-of-city club with the most participants. The then Governor, Price Daniel, had his state treasurer Jessie James make the first presentation. Lt. Governor Ben Barnes and Mayor Lee Cooke have also presented the trophy. The only governors to actually make the presentations were Preston Smith and Mark White.

Lone Star Charity Cup Regatta

Many of you have probably heard the news-now here's the rest of the story. The Lone Star Charity Cup was cancelled for this year. Many of you know that we had built in contingency plans in place if the water level remained low. The concept was to have the event hell or low water, but this assumed a high attendance to the land based money raising events; dinner/dance, silent auction. The cost of tent (dinner/dance/silent auction), crane (boat launching/ retrieval), porta potties, etc. etc. really takes money away from the cause that we are supposed to be benefiting. A few donors were interested in picking up these costs but it needs to be looked at in terms of benefit-cost. The charity that we were working with prides itself on passing through 87% of the money received and anything that takes away from achieving that percentage is detrimental. An equally important goal was to have a first class racing event. The races were the attraction and we had a committee that was focused on marketing the event and recruiting out of town sailors. The regatta committee had as a goal to make this one of the must do regatta's in Texas for the sailors that travel. Hard to get 'em to come if its difficult to launch their boats. Many traveling sailors will only crane launch and many trailers these days are not designed for deep water launching, therefore this is another cost that has to be considered when having a top tier regatta. All in all it may make more sense to collaborate with a marina/restaurant such as Emerald Point/Carlos n'Charlies if an event like this is to be held on Lake Travis. I believe in the formula as I have seen it work at a couple of other regatta's in Texas and would hope that someday we could get an event like this going at AYC. It is a challenge and I want to thank the 20 plus volunteers that spent time on organizing the event, attending the meetings and trying to make it happen. If we could've only signed up Mother Nature to make a contribution with about 35' of water! So now what do we do? For this year we can attempt to have a one day regatta like the Wild Turkey which is what this started out from in the first place. I'm not that committed to it to be honest and think we should take a look at Governors Cup attendance. If the number of volunteers to cook food, run RC, etc. etc. exceeds the number of people participating we ought to cancel for this year. How 'bout a rain dance instead

Ensign Fleet News


