Fall Series

Well, the Dog Days series is over, but the Dog Days themselves apparently are not. September 9, the opening of the Fall Series was hot and calm. After a postponement from shore, the deci-

sion was made to abandon races for the day after the obligatory wait. No surprise that shortly thereafter a light breeze filled in across the lake, at least allowing for some pleasure sailing or practice (practice?!). Go figure. Anyway, a handful of Ensign sailors at least put in the appearance of intending to sail: Jonathan and Sarah Baker, Randolph Bertin, Bill Hawk, Frans Dahmen, Kelly Groll, Norma and Danny Lien. Ken Jolly was out as well, even going so far as to raise his mainsail at the dock. Better luck next time.

Next Time

The following week, while not spectacular, provided enough wind to get around the course. Twice even, for a pair of W2s. They say that winning the start is half the battle. Unfortunately for Festina Lente (Randolph Bertin and crew), who got the best of both starts, it was the other half that made the difference. In the first race, Brews'er (The Grolls) moved in to the lead near the top of the first beat to windward, and managed to hold it for the duration. In the second race, Brews'er was all but out of the competition when they were left wallowing at the start after tacking into a wave in light air to get onto port. Downwind, Chaparral (Danny, Norma and Beka Lien with a special guest appearance by Frans Dahmen) wanted to go the right side, and had to sail over Festina Lente to get there. Unfortunately, Festina Lente kept trying to hold them off (ultimately unsuccessfully), sailing higher and higher, each time she was threatened. That left the door open for Brews'er to get right back in it. So, at the leeward

mark, it was back to a tight race, with *Chapar-ral* just in front. On the next windward leg, *Brews'er* was able to out point and overhaul *Chaparral*, securing another first place finish on the day. I should add that **Ken Jolly** also came out and started with the fleet before

withdrawing. Even a start and part of a race, is better than not sailing at all. The three boats that finished, placed in the same order in both races (*Brews'er, Chaparral, Festina Lente*).

Midway

Around noon, Fall Series 3 was looking like a repeat of the series opener, with almost no wind across the lake. However, it began to fill in, a little earlier than last time so that we avoided a lengthy postponement. Though light at first, it continued to build so that by the second race one might say that conditions were quite good! James Wilsford replaced The Grolls for a third Ensign on the line, and Ken Jolly returned in his Electra giving us another four boats. Given that some fleet members were sailing at the NOOD in Houston (Sarah Baker, The Grolls), and others have boats on the hard (Frans Dahmen and Bill Hawk), it could have been worse. In the first race, Danny and Norma Lien opted for a risky port start at the pin, just clearing Randolph by a boat length or two, and it paid off as he rounded in the lead. Downwind, though, they were caught out on the right side when a wide shift favored the boats who had gybed back to port. They still had a slight lead at the leeward mark, but ended up having their spinnaker wrapped around the forestay and having to sail past the mark on the wrong side. That allowed Randolph to take the lead and James to get right back in it (never give up in a sailboat race, as you never know what might happen to the boats ahead of you!). Randolph managed to extend his lead upwind and sail conservatively to a bullet. James ended up having a foul of his own at the second leeward mark setting him will back of **The Liens**. The second race of the day saw all four boats right on the line just before the start. Unfortunately, with about five seconds to go, Ken Jolly ran out of room at the pin and had to bail out and jibe around to start. The three Ensigns drove off to the left side of the course trying to get some separation. It took some time, but eventually Danny managed to work up enough to tack and cross James, with Randolph tacking over shortly after. Danny managed to dump a can of bad air molecules (ref: America's Cup TV coverage) on Randolph, though causing the latter to fall off to leeward. Going downwind, James and Randolph dueled to the mark with James pulling ahead until just before the pin when Randolph became overlapped inside. They came out of the rounding with Randolph just in front, so James decided to bail out and go left. Unfortunately for *Esmeralda*, left was not the way to go. All in all, it was a fun race from start to finish, and it was pretty clear when we returned to the dock, everyone had enjoyed the sailing.



is tall. Race 1 on the final day of September was one of the more interesting and exciting races we have had. The fleet was all over the lake, and large and frequent wind shifts could send a boat from first to last and last to first. More than once. Even so, the first leeward mark rounding had Festina Lente, Chaparral, and Brews'er all in a group. Hedonist and Esmeralda were fighting their own battle further back. When all was said and done, though, James Wilsford and his crew, Tom Holdridge and Dan Ellenbrook, found their own private freight train on the far left side of the course that propelled them from the back of the fleet up to the front. Randolph had managed to find himself in second at the approach to the final leeward mark, but Tom and Kelly were able to get inside at the final leeward mark rounding and cover the rest of the way. It was a hardfought and well-earned victory for Esmeralda.

The breeze in the second race was a little more steady with respect to direction. However, there was a bit of a Iull (see Mt. Everest is a little bit tall) during the downwind portion of the W1. And so we sat in the merciless heat and calm for what seemed like forever. At first it looked like the two boats to the west were going to come out like brilliant strategists (read 'lucky'), but the wind managed to come down the east side of the course as well, thus getting everyone moving downwind once again. Still, it was very slow going. Tom and Kelly managed to get the better of Danny, Norma and Beka on the final upwind leg. And even though James Wilsford and crew had to perform a 720 for fouling Brews'er at the mark, Randolph didn't have enough wind to take advantage and James preserved his third place finish by covering up the final beat.

Looking Ahead

Well, there isn't much ahead to look at... The Fall Series is going to be over after two more weeks (perhaps before you are reading this article!). The Leukemia Cup follows a week later, and the Wild Turkey Regatta will round out the year. Hard to believe, eh?

SouthCoast 21 Technical Tip of the Month: Installing a Lifting Eye in the South Coast 21 By Ray Shull

Installing a lifting eye allows you to pick up the South Coast 21 without the use of straps at the AYC work hoist. Having an internal lifting eye can also make launching the boat using a crane much easier since straps are also not needed, and no interference with trailer pads or support rails will occur. The process is fairly straightforward, but can be difficult because of the hardness of the material in the keel (cast iron) and the size of the eye bolt that is needed to safely carry the weight of the boat. The process is to drill a hole in the top of the keel, thread the hole with the use of a tap, install a load rated eye bolt, seal the hole, and cover the eye bolt so that corrosion is prevented. Leukemia Cup Regatta By Claude Welles




