This will be a party for all members, whether they raced the Summer Series or not, on August 2 at 7:00 p.m. which will feature great food, live music, and the Summer Series trophy presentation. Representatives from the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society will be on hand with some of their wonderful Heroes who have endured blood cancers as young persons. Some degree of pirate attire is of course *de rigueur*, and there will be three cash prizes:

•A crisp new \$100 bill for the best pirate costume;

Another crisp new \$100 bill for the best Jack Sparrow imitation; and

•A third crisp new \$100 bill for the best pirate costume worn on a racing boat during the entire day's races.

I am sure that the mathematically astute among you have noticed that the same person could win all three of these by racing in a really great pirate costume while channeling Johnny Depp and Keith Richards (J-24 sailors could have a built in advantage since this would be acting normal for them). **No Pirate behavior on the rigging dock though, please:** Why is there so much static on the rigging dock? Let me review a few simple rules for using the rigging dock without getting into hassles.

•Haul out is first come first serve, so dock behind the boats that are already there. If you can't do this because of space, immediately offer to walk your boat to the last place on the dock.

As boats are hauled out, walk your boat forward so that space frees up behind your boat for new arrivals.
If you leave your boat while haul outs are in progress, tie it up in the last place position by the bow only. (Continued on Page 7)

Junior Summer Camp: Summer sailing camp is underway, we just finished the 4<sup>th</sup> week, with one more to go. All the sessions were full. This year's camp staff is Kelly Hawk – Director, Josh Belury – Lead Instructor, Michelle Kasney – Instructor, Veronica Parker – Instructor, and Will Hawk – Junior Instructor. All have been doing an outstanding job. Note: Veronica and Michelle come to us from the UT Sailing team! The CIT's have also been doing a super job assisting with the camp as well as gaining valuable experience as future camp instructors. The winds have been good so far this summer, so the campers have been getting plenty of good sailing experience. The tee shirt project is fun and popular with the campers. When the wind is too light for sailing, they custom color their own shirts with the logo "Keep Austin Sailing", and cool off in the pool. Here is the camp story from Kelly Hawk our director:

So far this summer, the summer camp sail training team has run four very successful weeks of summer sailing camp for juniors aged 8 to 16; our last camp (July 7-11) has a long waiting list of young sailors eager to participate. Response from the campers and parents has been overwhelmingly positive and enthusiastic. "This is the best camp ever" was heard on many occasions during the last four weeks. Near-perfect sailing conditions combined with a caring and knowledgeable staff have made this one of the best summers yet.

The first few weeks of June were windy and gusty, so we progressed with caution and safety in mind. The older novice campers sailed on FJs with more experienced CITs until they mastered the basic skills of righting, tacking and jibing on their own. The younger sailors doubled up on Optis the first few days, but many ventured single-handedly out of the cove as their skills progressed. All campers hopped on a windsurfer at the end of each week, and many were able to windsurf around the mouth of the cove with confidence and speed. Toward the end of June, the winds subsided. and the campers took destination sails to Windy Point, Cypress Cove, and the main basin. Campers in the racing camp started over a dozen races and received continuous on-the-water instruction concerning starts and racing tactics. Many of the juniors and families who participated in the camps caught the "sailing bug" and expressed interest in joining the AYC and the MS/ HS junior sailing program.

A successful program is only as good as the people who run it, so many thanks go to our camp staff. Head counselor **Josh Belury** has done an outstanding job teaching over 100 novice and experienced sailors the basics of sailing, racing, and teamwork. Counselors **Michelle Kasney** and **Veronica Parker** have shared their UT sailing team racing skills to the campers through focused instruction and demonstrations on and off the water. Junior counselor **Will Hawk** has assisted the more experienced juniors who required advanced instruction on the Lasers and FJs. At the heart of this camp are the CITs who come to camp everyday with a (Continued on Next Page)

Junior Clinics: Thanks to the leadership of Christopher and Susan Dwight running Saturday (now Sunday) afternoon practice and race training sessions for the juniors we've picked the momentum for junior sailing, and now they have ramped it up notch with a more formal AYC Junior Sailing Program. The basic idea is for the Junior Program to start operationally running like a fleet with dues and some fund raising. The goal of the fund raising is to eventually be able hire a junior coach, and help pay for equipment and trips to junior regatta's. Look for and support the Juniors selling tee shirts at regattas, and holding cook outs at upcoming race events. Parents, jump on the bandwagon and volunteer! The timing is perfect to strengthen the Junior program as we want to capture and sustain the interest and skills of all these kids (close to 200) coming through the summer camp and PB&J programs.

A "Learn to Sail" day was held for the Sea Scouts on June 21. Scouts from ship 255 out of Killeen attended. Jim Johnstone, Hector Lujan, and myself took the scouts out on the lake for sail training after a short sail training lecture. Just as the scouts were rigging the boat the weather acted up, we had to wait before heading out, this shortened the time on the water, but they all did get a turn at the tiller, and were very excited to be out sailing for the first time. We have a couple of other ships in the area that missed this event, so I will be working with the area sea scout leaders to set up a 2<sup>nd</sup> event for them.

# Catalina 22 News By John Grzinich

#### Be-Bop-a-Lula's trip to the C22 Nationals – Grapevine, Texas

This year we were fortunate to have the C-22 Nationals nearby in Grapevine. The host Grapevine Sailing Club scheduled races the week after Memorial Day weekend, looking for better wind than they had when they last hosted in June, 1988. Times have changed, gas prices are higher, and the Texas school year has extended, so the turnout was nowhere near that '88 regatta, but still good with 27 boats in Gold Fleet, and 14 boats in Silver Fleet. People came from both coasts and the Texas/Georgia rivalry was in full swing. The Georgia contingent all sported tee shirts emblazoned with "We came to mess with Texas." Check-in was kind of interesting: in addition to normal sail measurement, the mast, whisker pole, and boom were measured, boats were checked to ensure all required safely gear was aboard, plus motors were weighed to ensure the 40-pound minimum. Monday's practice race was held in 20-plus knots; everyone flew jibs. I saw quite a few boats sail back to the marina on the last leg instead of going to the finish line, and I found out at the opening day dinner that many C-22 sailors believe it is bad luck to finish or win the practice race! Monday evening was the traditional C-22 National meeting where officers are elected; Tuesday was the first race day. Doug Laws and Jenny Loehlin crewed. Doug and I skipped the spinnaker racing, but Jenny crewed on another boat in the a.m. On Tuesday afternoon, right at the time racing was supposed to start, a storm blew in and it rained heavily until almost 3 p.m. Finally about 4 p.m., RC sent us out. Winds were fairly light so all had Genoa's up for the start. Within one minute after the start, a blast of 25+ knots blew in, white caps everywhere, everyone now in survival mode since it was too late to change headsails. We were an inside boat and adjusted for high wind keeping us in pretty good position. By the time boats got in the area of the weather mark, the wind died to just little wisps from many directions. After much maneuvering and place changes, we got around the weather mark when the wind filled in from the east allowing us to start sailing on reach to the leeward mark. Then the RC chase boat came around with the "abandon race" flag up. The flags seemed to indicate all racing for the day cancelled, so we started to head back. However, a little while later, RC came by with different flags, indicating there might be more racing. Anyway, they did manage to get in one race in fairly light conditions. When we finally got back in, we heard the tragic news that one of the C-22 racers, Don Owens from Houston, had died of a heart attack. Apparently he had the heart attack on the lake during the

wind storm. The crew radioed in the emergency and EMS was there when they got to the dock but was not able to save him. RC awarded Don honorary first place. The C-22 Spinnaker championship at the NOOD in September will be named after him.

Wednesday proved that no matter how light you thought the wind was the day before, it could get even lighter and they would still hold a race. I doubt we ever had more than 4 knots, and much of the race was less, or zero. The lead boats, as usual, caught a little puff on the downwind leg to finish on a shortened course, but we were at the back due a really bad start, and DNF'ed by missing the time limit, along with quite a few other boats including some of the top racers. This really hurt several key racers since there are no throwouts in the C-22 Nationals -- one bad race and you are dead meat. We were pretty bummed about the regatta at this point. Wednesday evening was the Mount Gay rum party along with an excellent BBQ dinner and raffle, improving the mood. Thursday proved to be a very nice sailing day with moderate wind. Three races were run and we were finally getting decent starts. These races are very long, and Lake Grapevine is very wide, so you can go a long way to hit a corner, which we were doing and it did not work as we lost a lot of positions on the final upwind legs even though we were mid-fleet at the first weather mark. In the final race of the day, the strategy of staying in the middle, plus focusing on covering and consolidating our position was emphasized and our tacking was finally getting smooth. We covered tight on the final upwind leg, won a tacking duel, and ended with our best finish, and my best Gold Fleet finish ever. Due to travel plans and race cancellations I had to miss two races. We pulled Be-Bop-a-Lula and got her ready for the trip back to Austin. I didn't come back emptyhanded; when they handed out some National Fleet awards, I did get a nice plaque for the Best Fleet Newsletter and Website for the previous year from Gene Ferguson, the editor of the C-22 magazine "Mainbrace." Georgia's Justin Chambers, last year's National Champ, dominated the Gold Fleet with 5 bullets, an amazing feat of sailing consistency in a wide range of conditions. Pete Harper came in 2<sup>nd</sup> in Gold Fleet. Craig and Martha White from Dallas came in 3rd, sailing the top C-22 Sport. Gene Ferguson came in 6th. Grapevine Sailing Club did an excellent job running the regatta. We all had very nice slips at the Scott's Landing Marina. For me, the experience of racing in a large very competitive fleet in long race course conditions is quite different than Lake Travis. The wonderful camaraderie among all the C-22 sailors I see every few years was worth the trip. There are links to tons of pictures from C-22 National web site at www.catalina22.org.

#### Ensign Fleet News By Randolph Bertin



**Summer's Here:** The Summer Series began Saturday, June 14. It was hot. Most of the strong winds that we had been seeing for the past several weeks had more or less disappeared. But there was enough wind to get us around for a couple of W1s.

Race 1: All six Ensigns were right on the line for the opening of the summer series. A few extra horn blasts after the start indicated that at least one of us was a little too eager to start racing. It was difficult to tell the offending boat(s). Bill Hawk turned Prickly Pair around, but even after he cleared the line, the over early flag still did not come down. Eagle took the East side going upwind, propelling them into the lead and on to a solid victory. Tom Groll, sailing with Larry Ratliff (and a special guest crew he had "picked up" the previous week at Friday's beer can race), maintained second place. Lewis Price was out on Dos Locos, and they worked over Randolph Bertin and Festina Lente downwind eventually getting inside position and moving into third overall. Mitch Barnett was sailing with only one other crew and they were trying to keep in front of the re-started Prickly Pair but could not quite hang on.

Race 2: Another strong start with the fleet crowding the line. Prickly Pair rounded the windward mark first and didn't let up. Festina Lente rounded second, just in front of Brews 'er, but Tom Groll in the latter passed Randolph Bertin on the downwind leg (unfortunately a common refrain for the day aboard Festina Lente). After going part way up the left side, Randolph went back to the right. Bad call. They went from hanging in there to dropping well astern. How do you lose an Ensign race? Tack. Six times. In light air. Going left, although it had been looking iffy for awhile, eventually pays off as Bill Hawk and company sail away for a strong win. Tom Romberg and Charlie Arnold on Eagle passed Festina Lente to finish third, behind Tom Groll. Mitch Barnett and Lewis Price rounded out the fleet finish.

The second racing day for the summer series brought some mid afternoon thunderstorms, leading to a postponement from shore. When the storms cleared, a nice little east wind started to fill in. Unfortunately, it disappeared shortly thereafter, and for a little while, it looked like there wasn't going to be much of any wind. Well, at least because of the showers, it was no longer scorching. Good things sometimes come to those who wait. Or at least something came, even if it wasn't all that good. In fact, it was pretty strange. A (barely) perceptible southeast breeze got us started, and by us I mean Eagle, Brews 'er, Festina Lente and Prickly Pair. Most of us where sailing with pretty standard crew with the exception of Prickly Pair where Bill Hawk was joined by Frans Dahmen and Danny Lien. And we were mostly in the general vicinity of the start line when the horn sounded for a W1. Mostly we sailed out to the left, sailing the big circle as the wind continually kept moving towards the south and even southwest. After rounding the windward mark, Prickly Pair and Festina Lente went toward the east side of the course, splitting with the other boats who opted for West. What mattered most, though, was that our south-ish breeze died, and was replaced a little thereafter by a light wind from the North (this on June 21!). And Prickly Pair was the farthest north so they got the new breeze first and sailed away. The other three boats eventually came together and were almost bow to bow heading to the leeward (now windward) mark. Well below the layline, Randolph Bertin tacked away, which turned out to be a very bad decision because the previous tack almost immediately thereafter was the beneficiary of a sizable lift, enabling those boats to round the mark while Randolph wallowed in a seeming wind hole.

Too many cooks didn't spoil the race for *Prickly Pair* as they went on to drub the rest of the fleet, while **Tom Groll** and **Tom Romberg** were dueling it out to the end for second place. By this time the north breeze was dying, with the wind returning full circle back to the east breeze that followed the storms. I'm not sure who ended up crossing the line first, but it may have been rendered immaterial as *Eagle* had potentially been involved in a foul on the previous leg. A strange afternoon on the water. A bit taxing. Still, it was sailing of a sort. So we had a good time.

**Coming Attractions:** The Ensign Fleet has Race Committee Duty for the next installment of the summer series on July 12. Please make an effort to come out and help. The following weekend, July 19, the Ensign sailors will have a post race social. Food, drinks, good cheer. Whether you are racing or not, join us and catch up with your fleet mates.

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And "Amen" to you, Brother Tom. Let's renew our commitment to sportsmanship. For those of you who are not yet doing it, it is AYC tradition to show appreciation for our volunteers each week by sailing past the back of the committee boat before going in after each day's races, being careful to stay well clear of the boats still racing, and thanking the race committee. A simple act, but it elevates both those who speak and those who hear. If you race sailboats, you're our friend.See you out there.

#### C22 Nationals By John Grzinich

#### Be-Bop-a-Lula's trip to the C22 Nationals – Grapevine, Texas

This year we were fortunate to have the C-22 Nationals nearby in Grapevine. The host Grapevine Sailing Club scheduled races the week after Memorial Day weekend, looking for better wind than they had when they last hosted in June, 1988. Times have changed, gas prices are higher, and the Texas school year has extended, so the turnout was nowhere near that '88 regatta, but still good with 27 boats in Gold Fleet, and 14 boats in Silver Fleet. People came from both coasts and the Texas/Georgia rivalry was in full swing. The Georgia contingent all sported tee shirts emblazoned with "We came to mess with Texas." Check-in was kind of interesting: in addition to normal sail measurement, the mast, whisker pole, and boom were measured, boats were checked to ensure all required safely gear was aboard, plus motors were weighed to ensure the 40-pound minimum. Monday's practice race was held in 20-plus knots; everyone flew jibs. I saw quite a few boats sail back to the marina on the last leg instead of going to the finish line, and I found out at the opening day dinner that many C-22 sailors believe it is bad luck to finish or win the practice race! Monday evening was the traditional C-22 National meeting where officers are elected; Tuesday was the first race day. Doug Laws and Jenny Loehlin crewed. Doug and I skipped the spinnaker racing, but Jenny crewed on another boat in the a.m. On Tuesday afternoon, right at the time racing was supposed to start, a storm blew in and it rained heavily until almost 3 p.m. Finally about 4 p.m., RC sent us out. Winds were fairly light so all had Genoa's up for the start. Within one minute after the start, a blast of 25+ knots blew in, white caps everywhere, everyone now in survival mode since it was too late to change




John, Jenny, and Doug inducing heel trying maintain some sail shape in race 2.

headsails. We were an inside boat and adjusted for high wind keeping us in pretty good position. By the time boats got in the area of the weather mark, the wind died to just little wisps from many directions. After much maneuvering and place changes, we got around the weather mark when the wind filled in from the east allowing us to start sailing on reach to the leeward mark. Then the RC chase boat came around with the "abandon race" flag up. The flags seemed to indicate all racing for the day cancelled, so we started to head back. However, a little while later, RC came by with different flags, indicating there might be more racing. Anyway, they did manage to get in one race in fairly light conditions. When we finally got back in, we heard the tragic news that one of the C-22 racers, Don Owens from Houston, had died of a heart attack. Apparently he had the heart attack on the lake during the wind storm. The crew radioed in the emergency and EMS was there when they got to the dock but was not able to save him. RC awarded Don honorary first place. The C-22 Spinnaker championship at the NOOD in September will be named after him.

Wednesday proved that no matter how light you thought the wind was the day before, it could get even lighter and they would still hold a race. I doubt we ever had more than 4 knots, and much of the race was less, or zero. The lead boats, as usual, caught a little puff on the downwind leg to finish on a shortened course, but we were at the back due a really bad start, and DNF'ed by missing the time limit, along with quite a few other boats including some of the top racers. This really hurt several key racers since there are no throwouts in the C-22 Nationals-- one bad race and you are dead meat. We were pretty bummed about the regatta at this point. Wednesday evening was the Mount Gay rum party along with an excellent BBQ dinner and raffle, improving the mood. Thursday proved to be a very nice sailing day with moderate wind. Three races were run and we were finally getting decent starts. These races are very long, and Lake Grapevine is very wide, so you can go a long way to hit a corner, which we were doing and it did not work as we lost a lot of positions on the final upwind legs even though we were mid-fleet at the first weather mark. In the final race of the day, the strategy of staying in the middle, plus focusing on covering and consolidating our position was emphasized and our tacking was finally getting smooth. We covered tight on the final upwind leg, won a tacking duel, and ended with our best finish, and my best Gold Fleet finish ever. Due to travel plans and race cancellations I had to miss two races. We pulled **Be-Bop-a-Lula** and got her ready for the trip back to Austin. I didn't come back empty-handed; when they handed out some National Fleet awards, I did get a nice plaque for the Best Fleet Newsletter and Website for the previous year from Gene Ferguson, the editor

of the C-22 magazine "Mainbrace." Georgia's Justin Chambers, last year's National Champ, dominated the Gold Fleet with 5 bullets, an amazing feat of sailing consistency in a wide range of conditions. Pete Harper came in 2<sup>nd</sup> in Gold Fleet. Craig and Martha White from Dallas came in 3<sup>rd</sup>, sailing the top C-22 Sport. Gene Ferguson came in 6<sup>th</sup>. Grapevine Sailing Club did an excellent job running the regatta. We all had very nice slips at the Scott's Landing Marina. For me, the experience of racing in a large very competitive fleet in long race course conditions is quite different than Lake Travis. ## SC-21 Technical News By Bruce McDonald



A Self Steering Device for the Budget Minded South Coast Sailor

Last year, I did a series of articles on repairs and upgrades for the South

Coast 21. Most of these required a significant investment of time and money. I got the feed back that many SC 21 sailors do not like to spend time and money on their boats, so, in deference to that contingency I offer this series of quick and cheap fixes.

When the SC 21 was first built in the 70s, the radical new design with a fin keel and spade rudder meant that it could turn on a dime. Adjusted for inflation, that would be more like a quarter today, but still a tight turning radius. This is great for jockeying for a position on the start line or dodging incoming starboard tackers, but can be rather disconcerting when on one leaves the tiller for a split second only to return and realize that the boat is now headed in the opposite direction from where it was going only moments before. What is needed is a device which is simple (and cheap) that will tame the wayward tiller.

A search of the internet revealed many devices that claim to provide this cure, but for \$40 to well over \$100, not including the larcenous tax, shipping and handling. Highway robbery, I say, highway robbery. The budget minded SC 21 sailor deserves better than this. To complete this project, one needs only two stainless pad eyes with fasteners and one 30" Bungee cord (available at Home Depot for \$1.25) which brings the cost of the

project to \$1.25, since you have the pad eyes and fasteners in that big box of fittings that you have taken off the boat in the first place. Install the pad eyes on the vertical portion of the cockpit seat on either side of the tiller. Caulk well. Attach the Bungee cord. To engage the system, drape the Bungee over the tiller. The final result looks something like this.



The addition of the coach whipping and Turk's heads to the tiller adds friction to the system. The self steering device also helps to keep the tiller under control at the dock and when launching.



#### **Dock Work Party**

On June 22<sup>nd</sup> we held a half-day dock work party to resecure foam under Dock 2 and Dock 3. This three to four foot mini-tsunami really bounced our boats around, and it was amazing to see just how much force the boats can apply to our dock fingers with such a wave. For many of those present, this event crystallized the importance of both the repair work being done to our docks, and also the importance of proper dock lines (size, condition, and tension).

This project's success was in large part because of Tom Cunningham, whose expertise and knowledge empowered those of us with limited dock work experience to be productive contributors. 
never thirsty. If you missed the sign-in sheet, then I probably missed your name in the thank-you list – my apologies and thanks go out to you as well!

#### Dock Move is Likely

If you've been out to AYC lately you have probably noticed our lake level is dropping, and Pool Canyon cove is getting narrower. 


Photo left: Tom Romberg takes third in Spinnaker B along with everyone's chips and first in the poker tournament.



Cynthia Woods Keel is found!

The 38-foot **Cynthia Woods** capsized on the night of June 6 in the Gulf of Mexico while competing in the Regata de Amigos, a

sailing race from Galveston to Veracruz, Mexico. A Coast Guard helicopter rescued five members of the Texas A&M University at Galveston Offshore Sailing Team early on June 8 reportedly 27 miles off the Texas coast near Freeport. The body of the sixth crew member, safety officer Roger Stone, was found that afternoon, and funeral services were held on June 12. One of the surviving crew members, **Ross Busby**, is reportedly current Captain of the Texas A&M Sailing Team and also attended the AYC summer sailing camp with his brother, **Connell**. The keel had been found in 113 feet of water 32 miles off Freeport in the Gulf of Mexico. It had been supposedly repaired several times. This tragic event emphasizes the need for adequate maintenance and repair of your sailboat as well as the need to follow safety precautions at all times.

# Flanders Regatta Report By Eric Rochard

The Flanders Youth regatta is a major European event, this year the Belgian, British, Danish, Dutch and French world team choose this regatta as the last practice before the Optimist World Championship in Turkey from Jul, 14<sup>th</sup> to Jul, 25<sup>th</sup>. The USODA sent a team of 15 sailors selected at Team Trials in May.

It is a very diverse team with sailors from California, Illinois, New Jersey, Florida and Texas. The 2 coaches **Chris and Juan Carlos** are from Annapolis Yacht Club.

Wednesday the team picked up their charter boats, and tried to go out on the North Sea, but outside it was blowing 35 knots with 8 feet waves! Only 4 sailors, including **Alan Rochard**, made it out of the harbor, wisely the coaches cancelled the practice. Thursday was more manageable and they spent the full day on the water. Friday was off and it was team trip to visit Brugges, a very nice medieval town 20 miles away.

Saturday was very windy, 20kn with gust up to 30kn.

**Alan** was doing very well with the leading pack, unfortunately they caught up with the previous fleet at the finish line and in the confusion **Alan** missed the finish line due to a coach boat anchored in the finish area. He was 5 at the last mark and the US coach told him he would have finished 6 at worst, but it is a DNF! For the 2<sup>nd</sup> race of the day the tidal current is quite strong and **Alan** has gone too far on the right side and he has to reach to the first mark, he rounded 17<sup>th</sup> and finished 11<sup>th</sup>. **Alan** has a good speed in 20/30knots of wind. This is very encouraging, but the DNF in the first race is a serious handicap.

The 2nd day was more challenging with 25 17 and 27. The conditions were 10 to 15 knots of wind with a strong chop. A good night of sleep and Monday results were encouraging: 16 17 and 26. By finishing 40 of the series **Alan** gualified in the Gold fleet.

On Tuesday the wind was 10 to 15 knots from shore, in the first race **Alan** took a good start and rounded the weather mark 2<sup>nd</sup> behind the regatta leader, **Corto Viel**, they finished the race in this order. The last race of the day was a finish of 8<sup>th</sup>, 2 top 10 finish for the first day of Gold fleet! Tuesday was the last day of racing, the first race was abandoned due to lack of wind. The final result is 26<sup>th</sup> (6<sup>th</sup> of the American sailors).

Racing against best European sailors was a great experience, for his first participation in the US international team **Alan** is happy to finish in the middle of the Gold fleet.


