If you missed **Gary Jobson's** visit to AYC as part of the Mount Gay Rum Speaker Series on April 25th, you missed a real treat. Gary is an incredibly entertaining speaker, even without the rum. He regaled a sold-out crowd at AYC with nearly two hours of absolutely stunning video covering everything from America's Cup racing to Opti racing to cruising in Antartica, all interspersed and accented with anecdotes from a long and very colorful career.

As you may recall, Gary visited AYC last year on the Mount Gay Rum Speaker Series Circuit. Impressively, his talk and video was completely new this year. The only repeat was when our esteemed Commodore, **Bob Goldsmith**, asked him to re-tell a story that he told last year of a pair of races off of Long Island Sound. Gary obliged, and the story was just as good the second time. All in all it was an excellent evening.

['So, where's he going with this', you ask. 'What does this have to do with yearning for the vast and endless sea—or the end taking care of itself?']

One of the things that struck me, at some point during the evening of Gary Jobson's visit was that the chairs that were set up in the clubhouse were not AYC chairs. Somebody had had to arrange to rent chairs and get them out to the Club and get them all set up. And somebody also had had to move all the regular tables and chairs out of the clubhouse to make room for the rented chairs. And somebody had had to go out and buy the mojito mix to make the very excellent Mount Gay mojitos that **Roy Crouse** was serving before and after the talk. And somebody, with planning skills capable of venturing well beyond the next 24 hours, had had to make arrangements for Gary Jobson to be there with us, telling his most excellent stories and mesmerizing us with video of racing scenes that most of us see only in our dreams.

The last race of the Spring Series was Sunday, May 4th. [Wow! That was an abrupt transition! Where's he going now?] After the race, those who stuck around for the party were treated to a delightful serenade by a two-man New Orleans jazz ensemble while enjoying home-made muffelattas and adult beverages. But wait, there's more! While we were sitting around in the clubhouse listening to the music, before the muffelattas were ready, there were people bringing nachos around to the tables! Yes, you read that right, they were bringing food and setting it on the table right in front of you, without you even having to get up and go get it or even ask for it or anything! And there weren't even any tip jars! Is this a crazy world or what?

Every year, for Turnback Canyon Regatta, scores of heavy steel stakes are hauled from AYC to the Bar K Park at Lago Vista and driven, one by one, into the rocky ground to provide tie-ups for the race participants. After the racers leave on Sunday, somebody goes out and pulls up all the stakes and loads them up and hauls them back to AYC. (Still no tip jars!)

When I was in high school, I worked as a delivery boy for a neighborhood pharmacy in Beaumont, Texas. [Whoa! Yet another head-spinning transition. Now where's he going? Wait, maybe this is the 'beginning.'] Back then (not so long ago really, in geologic time), in small towns across America, you could call in a prescription to your neighborhood pharmacy and have it delivered right to your door, along with a Pangburn's chocolate sampler and the latest issue of the National Enquirer. I worked weekends and a couple of evenings during the week, allowing the regular delivery man to have some days and evenings off. The regular delivery man, "R.C.," was a grizzled old son of East Texas, with 20 some-odd years of service to Smith's Pharmacy under his cracked leather belt.

At one point during my several years at Smith's a new system was implemented for recording and tracking Medicare payments. It involved running Medicare cards (Continued on Next Page)

through an imprint machine—like the old-fashioned credit card machines—and recording customer names and Medicare numbers on a three-part carbon form in the boxes provided—one letter or number to a box, print neatly within the lines. Mr. Hilburn, the pharmacist, hated filling out and imprinting these forms, so he wasted no time in showing me how to do it. One day, I asked R.C. if Mr. Hilburn had showed him how to fill out the Medicare forms. He replied, "Naaah. I learnt me a lon' time ago dat it doan' pay to learn nothin' new-it jus' mean more work."

R.C. was a good man. I enjoyed working with him, and his world view opened my eyes to a perspective that I had never known. But R.C. was not a volunteer. He was happy within the boundaries that he had set for himself and saw no need to venture beyond them. He never would have raised his hand when someone asked who could go set stakes up at Bar K so that the Turnback boats would have a place to tie up. He never would have offered up a hundred hours of his personal time designing an excavation plan that would free us from endless cycles of moving docks when the lake drops below 660. He never would have brought nachos to your table, unbidden.

I am amazed and humbled by the volunteers that make AYC what it is—that literally make AYC run. From Race Committee to scoring to social events to the Telltale and the web site and virtually every aspect of the infrastructure that we take for granted, volunteers are the heart and soul of AYC. Nothing about AYC would be what it is without the support of the many volunteers that contribute their time and talents.

One thing I do know. Every time I've volunteered for something at AYC (and my record in that regard pales in comparison to many) I've learned something. And yes, it usually has meant 'more work.' But the work has always seemed meager payment for what I've learned. I've gotten to know a lot of people that I didn't know before, and I've learned how to do things that I didn't know how to do before. And it's been fun. I highly recommend

Adult Sail Training

ASA Training: ASA class inquiries and registrations continue to come in ahead of the plan. We've had a dozen paid registrations YTD which meets the full year plan. Adult Clinics: The next adult clinic is "Keelboat Learn to Sail" scheduled for May 17th has filled up, so I will have work on planning a 2nd clinic, most likely sometime in early fall. The response to this clinic offering is another indicator of an up tick in an interest in sailing we are seeing in the area as all the registrations are from non-AYC members. Some adults are taking the "Learn to Sail" who signed up their kids in our Summer Camp or PB&J, so we are getting whole families engaged in learning to sail.

Junior Sail Training Programs

Junior Summer Camp: I have a tendency to over use the phrase "Stay Tuned", but in this case I really mean it in the literal sense. KXAN is planning to do a TV spot May 8th at AYC to highlight our junior summer sailing camp as part of their May summer camp information series. Kelly Hawk our camp director will be there along with some of our AYC juniors to demo boat set up and sailing. When I find the actual broadcast time I'll post in "News" of our AYC home page.

Registration for the Junior Summer Camp has been pretty strong, the first and last weeks is already full, and a few are 'wait listed'. Harbor News

Slip Assignments

Just in time for the most recent billing cycle, several pending slip assignments were processed. Following is an activity summary for harbor changes in the past month.

- Five wet slips were released
- Two wet slip occupants agreed to move to alternate slips to accommodate more active sailors
- Four pending move requests were processed
- Four new slip requests were processed
- Two new board boat slips were assigned
- Three dry sail area slips were released
- One dry sail assignment was moved
- Three new dry sail slips were assigned

Our AYC harbor is near capacity with only inside wet slips or somewhat shallow wet slips currently available. We have only one remaining board boat slip available. In the dry sail area, we have one slip open towards the end, and four more dry sail slips at the back of the storage area. If you are thinking about requesting storage, I suggest you act quickly!

The updated wait list is available in the AYC office. In the coming weeks, I'll update the AYC web site to reflect the recent storage and wait list changes.

Harbor Rule Reminder of the Month

Harbor rule 16 defines AYC policies for slip assignments whenever there is a change in boat ownership, including changes involving multiple owners or partnerships.

Slips Non-Transferable: Assigned storage spaces are not for sale or sub-lease by members. The Board may require a space to be vacated if, in its opinion, the sale of all or part of a boat amounts to, in substance, the sale of the space to a member who has not qualified for a space by normal progression through the applicable priority list, such as a case in which the original space holder has become an inactive partner in the use of the boat.

Any member(s) entering into joint boat ownership with an existing slip holder must notify the AYC Club Manager and Fleet Commander in writing within 30 days of the joint ownership commencement date.

Any member(s) entering into joint boat ownership with an existing slip holder shall be required to vacate the slip:

- **A.** On sale of all of the original slip holder's interest in said jointly owned boat or any subsequent replacements thereto, or
- B. If the original slip holder relinquishes his/her slip through resignation, board action, leave of absence, or voluntary action as described in the last paragraph of the Harbor Rule 13, unless the remaining owner-member(s) qualifies for a permanent slip by normal progression through the dock priority list.

So what does all this mean? First and foremost, transfer of boat ownership requires a slip to be vacated. A slip assignment does not transfer to the new owner.

There are currently several AYC member boats that are for sale. Upon the sale of these boats, the current slip assignment must be released. This is different from policies at commercial marinas, which will often encourage new owners to take over an existing slip lease. If you have a boat that is currently for sale, please be sure to clearly communicate this important policy to any potential buyer: AYC slip assignments are non-transferable.

To secure a slip at AYC, a new owner must be an AYC senior (or senior probationary) member and proceed through the normal slip request process. For wet slips (where we have a pending wait list), this could take several months and will be a different slip assignment.

For fractional ownership situations, things are slightly more complex. The assigned slip holder is expected to continue to personally use the boat as defined in harbor rule 14, slip usage policy. If the assigned slip holder is substantially inactive in using the fractionally-owned boat, it would effectively grant the storage assignment to another member who has not qualified for a space by normal progression through the applicable priority list. In such a case, slip assignment may be revoked.

Note that any changes in ownership, including changes in fractional ownership, must be communicated to the fleet commander and club manager within thirty days.

Like all other AYC rules, harbor rule 16 is designed to help maintain a membership which will actively and enthusiastically support the programs of the Club, particularly racing activities.

Your cooperation with this policy not only ensures that AYC facilities are equally available to all members, but also gives fair treatment to those members on the wetslip waiting list.

If you are interested please contact **Kelly Hawk** to get on the Junior Roadrunner email distribution list for the session announcements. A typical session goes for about 2 hours starting about 4PM.

Last month myself, Linda McDavitt, and Eric Rochard held a brainstorming session with Patrick Hitchens the UT Team Coach, and Mark Hulings the UT Team Captain to discuss ideas for junior sail training. Everyone agreed the one of the best next steps to capitalize on all the kids going through the PB&J and summer camp programs would be an "Opti Green Fleet" training program. Finding a coach is the first challenge to implementation. As result of this discussion, Scott Young offered to help with some Junior Racing Clinics over the summer. Christopher and Scott are setting the first session on Saturday May 10th, and it will be announced through the AYC Roadrunner email.

In June I plan to hold a "learn to sail" day for the Sea Scouts. This is an attempt to help in rebuilding the Sea Scout program in our area, and establish a new relationship with AYC.

PB&J Sessions: Registrations for the PB&J sessions have been going like gangbusters this year. Both June sessions, and the early August session are full and wait listed. The July windsurfer sessions have had minimal response, so **Doug Kern** is working on a plan and staffing to convert the July sessions to the regular junior program and then work through the wait list to get kids placed. Hopefully, the July session can absorb most of the wait listed people and any additional registrations so we get all these kids out sailing this summer. The work has started to get the Opti's and Pico's ready for this summers' PB&J sessions with a boat clean up day last Saturday.

Clift Price arranged for a lunch meeting with Boyd Taylor, several times President of Westwood Country Club and Boyd shared much valuable information with us about club management and regulatory issues. We have already made some significant change based upon things we learned from our discussion with Boyd and thank him very much. Past Commodore and current Treasurer Tom Romberg arranged another lunch meeting with the Highland Lakes' top authority on legal issues, Conrad Werkenthin, and Conrad shared, and continues to share, his thoughts with us on certain matters of importance to the club. As well as being a very distinguished attorney, Conrad is a former AYC member and multiple Turnback chairman, and his counsel has been invaluable.

We are trying to use the executive sessions immediately before the Board meetings for education on AYC issues, and this month's executive session featured a presentation by **Tom Groll** and **Danny Lien** on the Long Range Planning Committee's design for a new harbor configuration which should largely eliminate the need to move the docks to the point during times of low water. **Ray Shull** has also been instrumental with the committee which designed the new configuration and as the engineers say, it is an "elegant solution." You will be hearing a lot more about this in the future as the Board, with strong guidance from Fleet Commander **Christopher Dwight**, considers whether the new plan is right for AYC.

Great racing, great social events, plans for the future... it is an exciting time to be a member of AYC.

Founders' Day Racing

Spring Series #3, April 13, had the honor of following the Founders' Day celebration. It was a blustery day, with shifting winds out of the North and Northeast and Northwest. The wind would kick up a fair bit, but then moderate for a while. But just when you thought it might settle in, it would freshen up considerably, and then again, fall back down after awhile. Even the lower end of the wind range was still considerably breezy, but in between the first and second race, it really began to howl. The Lake Travis Test Station showed a max gust on the afternoon of 32 mph. Suffice to say, we all had our hands full. Regardless of the challenging conditions, the Ensign fleet had nine boats start the first of the race, and even though they didn't complete the race, it was still great to have Amie Rodnick and Larry Smith out on Travis Moons and Jim Casto sailing solo on One With the Wind for a big start. Also of note, Mitch Barnett, sailing with Jonathan 'Dudley' Apgar and Deanne competed in their first race on the new-to-the-fleet Ensign 1198, and they were right there on the start line with the rest of us and seemed to have a tremendously good time rounding the buoys, and they even managed to avoid DFL! Congratulations to the new guys. Tom and Kelly Groll got the best of the fleet, rounding the first windward mark with a lead in both races, and making it stand the rest of the distance. Tom Romberg and Hap and Charlie Arnold on Eagle edged out Festina Lente in the day's opening race to pick up second. Jonathan and Sarah Baker had a spinnaker sheet break on the opening race and the ensuing difficulties shot them out to the back of the fleet. Lewis Price on Dos Locos was out as well, sailing in the middle of the fleet much of the afternoon. Elliott Bray and Doug Laws meanwhile already appeared much improved over their first sail from two weeks before. Randolph Bertin and crew (Continued on Page 10)

managed to keep the pressure on **The Grolls** in the second race of the day, but weren't able to find a passing lane and finished with a second. The rest of the fleet actually stayed in very close competition throughout the race, but it was **The Bakers** who had managed to get things sorted out after their sheet failure in the opening race to pick up a third, while **Eagle** fouled **Dos Locos** at the start and their ensuing 720 put a dent in their plans to finish in the top half of the fleet.

More Spring

On Sunday, April 20, Spring Series #4 started in very light air for the Ensign fleet, as we crept across the starting line. About halfway up the first windward leg, the wind began to fill at least a little, and continuing from a fairly easterly direction so that most of us were laying the upwind mark on port tack right from the start line. In the early going, Tom and Kelly Groll on Brews 'er were battling it out with the heavy hitting line-up on Prickly Pair of Bill Hawk, Danny Lien and Jonathan Baker. Tom Romberg and Charlie Arnold were hanging in to round out the top half of the fleet. Though at times it seems as if The Grolls were going to sail away leaving no doubt about the outcome, Eagle and Prickly Pair weren't giving up. And it was on the final windward leg, as the wind had finally begun to clock to the southeast, that things got very interesting. Brews 'er was coming in on starboard to finish with Eagle less than two boat lengths out. Prickly Pair was approaching on port tack, clearly unable to cross. They held course. and held a little longer with Tom vociferously asserting his right away with a call of "STARBOARD!" that could be heard even by those of us in the back half of the fleet, well out of contention. Tom luffed up (To avoid the port boat? To shoot the line?) as Bill Hawk (eyes closed and relying on his crew to call the shots) tacked to starboard, just crossing the finish line head to wind, a nose ahead for the win. No fouls were called. Eagle came in just after for a third place finish. It was pretty dramatic, even from well over half way down the leg (the distance back from which Doug Laws and crew, Mitch Barnett and his father Randy, and Festina Lente were slogging upwind). There was another exciting port/starboard crossing on the day as Doug Laws came from well back on the final leg, heading toward the finish line on starboard having gained a considerable to close the gap with Mitch Barnett. The latter held on though and just managed to clear on port tack to seal the deal shortly before crossing the finish.

In the second race (with a nice breeze and a now even course), **Team Groll** was over early and called back to re-start. Fortunately, they were able to swing in under **Doug Laws**, jibe away to port and head over to the

right side when what do you know but a very nice lift on port came in putting them right back in the race! They managed to make the initial mark rounding in second behind Bill Hawk (Danny and Jonathan). Eagle managed to overtake Festina Lente on the first downwind leg by gaining an inside overlap but Randolph Bertin, sailing with Beka Lien in addition to his regular crew, got it back going upwind. Even stellar crews can slip up, and during a quick spinnaker strike, the spinnaker halyard on Prickly Pair was pulled a little too far, as in all the way through the block at the top of the mast and back down to the deck. The absence of a spinnaker cost them on the long down wind leg as Randolph, Iggy, Beka and Pete were able to overtake them before rounding the leeward mark, and then simply sailing with good speed upwind to build on their lead and take second to Tom and Kelly who, though not having to sweat the finish, at least had to work all the way.

Again, there was some enjoyable competition up and down the line as **Doug** and **Mitch** sailed as a little fleet within the fleet, becoming a little more comfortable and experienced in handling the Ensign.

Post Race Social

All the fleets gathered under the clubhouse for a post race social to introduce new club members to the various fleets (and maybe even get some of the existing fleet members to talk with each other!). The Ensigns provided a mess of venison chili courtesy of **The Grolls**, plus a number of other appealing side dishes, along with pleasant conversation about the day's events and sundry sailing and non-sailing topics.

Spring Finale

Very strong North winds followed by afternoon thunderstorms doomed the races scheduled for April 27. With one weekend remaining, Tom and Kelly Groll (Brews 'er) had a pretty firm grip on the top spot in the series, and Randolph (Festina Lente) was pretty much alone in second, and little opportunity to make significant gains in two races. There were three boats tied for third place: Prickly Pair, J. Seagull, and Dos Locos, any one of whom would have had a fair shot at picking up some hardware on the final day. It was a strange afternoon on the water, starting with an east breeze out of Cypress Creek, with the dramatic shifts that often accompany wind from that direction, especially up in the mouth of the inlet, where the windward mark had been positioned. That made for some dramatic changes over the course of the first race, with the exception of Brews 'er remaining true to form and leading start to finish. Festina Lente had serious difficulties with their downwind spinnaker handling. Thankfully, they were joined by Sarah Baker as crew, and she was able to help sort (Continued on Next Page)

things out and prevent the situation going from bad to worse. At the first leeward mark rounding, Festina Lente passed the mark and just kept sailing away as they tried to get the spinnaker down (which had hourglassed around the forestay) and/or the genoa up. After a hundred yards or so (and what seemed like forever), they finally got things squared away and headed back up wind, finding themselves at the back end of the fleet. But, the left side, which had paid off so well for Brews'er on the first leg, was still a going proposition, and they managed to sail all the way back into second place by the time they reached the windward mark. Doug Laws and Elliott Bray were joined by Bill Hawk on #810, and they were making serious advances on second place in the final downwind leg, as Randolph and company had already pulled down their spinnaker after yet another hourglass problem. A huge shift to the south, though, ended up catching the spinnaker of #810 and wrapping it around the forestay, while Festina Lente sailed off on a nice reach under Genoa. Newcomer Mitch Barnett (joined by Danny Lien) had also been looking good for awhile downwind (without a spinnaker, as the topping lift had snapped on their initial hoist). Unfortunately, the wind deserted them on the left side heading downwind, leaving them wallowing while the wind filled in for their competitors on the other side. Dos Locos was also racing, but no sign of Lewis Price on board as there appeared to be a mystery skipper and crew working their way around the fickle winds of the course.

With the aforementioned shift toward the southsoutheast holding steady, the race committee re-set the course for the second race. Tom Groll again started strong on starboard at the left side of the fleet. But Randolph was on his hip and Mitch was quickly gaining inside that. Tom crossed and cleared one boat, but not the second as they came out of their tack with too little speed. With a cry of, "I've fouled! Please don't hit me!" Mitch was warned off and tacked away to avoid a collision and Tom took his penalty turns. By the time Brews'er was done spinning, returning to starboard was looking more attractive, and so he managed to work his way right back into the race. Plenty of tight tactical maneuvering at the windward mark, but Mitch was caught low and underneath a couple of boats and lost steam as he tried unsuccessfully to pinch above the mark, hitting it (for the second time that day!). Live and learn. That left Randolph able to round in first, but their lead was short lived as they sailed well to the outside trying to sort out spinnaker difficulties (a constant refrain on the day). Meanwhile, Elliott and Doug were battling it out with Tom down the middle of the course for control downwind, and they maintained their neck and neck

race to the finish, with the former winning the final race of the series by a neck. Congratulations to **Doug** and **Elliott** for picking up their first victory in the Ensign fleet! Meanwhile, further back... **Mitch** had taken the committee boat side of the downwind leg and reached the leeward mark slightly ahead of **Randolph**, just enough ahead for a motor boat to come barreling through the gap between the boats in as reckless a display as many of us have had the opportunity to witness. **Mitch**, ahead and to leeward, tacked to cross. **Randolph** went a little further out, toward the committee boat layline before tacking. Just before the finish, **Sarah** called for a tack back to port which made the difference as they crossed the line seconds ahead for third.

The big story of the series was that with all three of the third place boats failing to show for the final day, **Doug** and **Elliot** put together a strong performance on the water with a third and a first to climb from seventh all the way to third place, tied with **Dos Locos** for points, but winning on a tiebreaker by virtue of their first place finish in the last race. No small irony that **Bill Hawk**, who could have won third by completing even one of the races on the final day, was an integral part of helping **Ensign #810** take the prize. On the whole, it was a very good series, with plenty of great sailing days and loads of fun on the water, and we had five different boats claim a first place in eight races.

The next Series does not begin until June 14, switching to Saturdays. In the meantime, you can get your sailing fix with some beer can races, Turnback Canyon regatta, or just cruising the lake.



U.S. Team Trials 2008




"Team Texas"



Last year I finished 82, so my goal was to do better. I arrived on Tuesday evening and after a short practice Wednesday I completed the measurement in the Afternoon. The first day of regatta has not been great, 67 36 and 57! I was 103 overall. It was a huge disappointment for a full year of intense practice. I decided to forget about the goal and just enjoy the remaining of the races. The fourth race was good; I started at the committee boat and sailed hard to the right corner. Instead of forcing my luck I crossed into the leading pack and rounded in the 20 the weather mark for a finish of 19th. With the dying wind on the Chesapeake Bay that was all for the day. I was now 82 overall, still some hope to make it! But an OCS or BFD would sink my ranking, so no risk at the start! Saturday was a great day: 9 and 16! I was now 51st before the last day of regatta! Close to the top 50 but with 2 bad races. Sunday morning a good NW breeze allowed me to recover from a bad start and fish 18, definitively looking better!

But on race 8 on the last leg the wind from the NW died to come back from ESE. Hughh. I am on the left and get 46th, probably out of the top 50. Fortunately there is a last race with 10-12 knots of puffy wind (like on Lake Travis), I am in 20-30 at the last gate but I get it right upwind to finish 14th. Big smile, finally I am 39th in the US International team. I will go to one of the Continental Championships!

11. RADIO COMMUNICATION - A boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communications not avail-

12. PRIZES - Three boats will constitute a class. Trophies will be awarded to helmspersons in accordance to the overall size of their respective Class as follows:

7-9 participants 3 trophies

- 10+ participants 1 additional trophy for each additional 3 participants

The Levins Trophy will be awarded to the boat with best corrected time for the race from AYC to Turnback Canyon.
