Race Commander Report by Barry Bowden



The Dog Days Series began on Saturday June 22 and so far has lived up to its name. The first race had 20 boats participating and the second race a week later saw only 15 brave the 105 degree temperatures to come out to race. An easterly wind made for a short course and the lake swallowed up the Bruce anchor on the race committee boat.

Hopefully it will have been retrieved by the time this article is read.

On a more positive note, which is becoming more difficult to hear, we have reconfigured the docks and a rigging dock is now present on the metal ramp that **Vic Manning** and team put in the water before Turnback Canyon. Boats that haven't been wet in quite a while may now be launched and some that have been in the water a bit too long have been retrieved for overdue maintenance on their bottoms. If you have been stuck in dry sail with most any size boat that can live in the dry sail area, please come out and get your boat wet. There is even a bit of room for overnight parking.

The Dog Days Series will end on July 27. We have no series races scheduled until September. However, the Friday Night Beer Can races and the Wednesday Sunfish and Laser races are still going strong. Secretary Report by Jen Schwan

Buildings & Grounds Report by John Saunders



Due to the extended drought and summertime heat, the grasses at AYC are more fragile. If a vehicle is driven over them, they will die. If a vehicle is parked on the grass areas, the catalytic converter heat may kill the grass, or in the worst case, create a fire.

Launching

On the point, please be aware of launching locations. There are two steel ramps that are pretty evident, as well as a couple of other locations that are being used. I know they are not too well marked, but please do not block these or their approaches. Today it is me trying to launch, tomorrow you.

UPDATE: As the lake has dropped even more over the last couple weeks, the newer NE steel mat ramp became unusable due to the contour of the shore beneath the steel mat. A particularly steep drop off made it a trap for anyone backing their vehicle too far down. We believe that there was a real danger of a member losing his or her vehicle into the lake because of the incline and smooth steel surface. Even **Fred Schroth** would not take his foot off the brake while a boat was loaded on the trailer. We had the mat ramp pulled out of the water so that we can improve the situation. That location is not a ramp at this time.

In the meantime, there is a launching site on the end of the point between the Junior dock and the walkway to the other docks. It is somewhat marked with rocks and paint. The tri's and some other shallower draft boats have been using it for some time. It is firm and drops slowly to about six feet at the SW corner of C dock. There is another site closer to the Junior dock that is muddy from the water level down. It might be tempting, but watch out! When using any of these auxiliary sites, please use caution, ask for assistance and, if in doubt, wait.

I realize conditions are not perfect, but we try to get by and enjoy the club and lake. We are fortunate to have such a recourse in this semi-arid area.

Electric Shock Drowning (ESD)

Many of you know about this problem. Below is a link to a good article that was published in Boat US July "Seaworthy" magazine. Although we do not have electrical connections on our docks, we visit other marinas. As boats get bigger and demand more services, this problem increases.




Please welcome the following new members who joined AYC on July 1:

Curtis Tarpley - Curtis is a past member who first joined AYC in 1991. He and his wife Lacey have



3rd Annual AYC Fleet Challenge for the Bernstein / Brinkmann Trophy

The 3nd Annual AYC Fleet Challenge is rapidly approaching! After the hugely successful inaugural event in 2011 and a great follow-up year last year, we will work this year to make the event bigger and better!

The AYC Fleet Challenge is the main fund raising event each year for the AYC Fund. In each of the first two years of this event, the AYC Fund raised over \$20,000. In turn, the AYC Fund has made strategic investments that are really making a difference at AYC and for sailing in Central Texas.

Your generosity and participation in the AYC Fleet Challenge has allowed AYC to create a full-time director of sailing position and as a result, we are seeing junior and sail training participation soar. At the same time, by introducing these participants and their families to AYC through these programs, AYC is seeing a strong surge in new family memberships in 2013.

For this year's event, each AYC Fleet will be allowed an "A" and "B" Division skipper. A separate crew for each division is encouraged but not required. The Fleet Challenge will be an "intercollegiate" style event with very short courses held close to the end of the docks for optimum cheer leading and boat switching. We will have all 18 of the new FJs that were purchased for the 2012 Intercollegiate North American Championship (with the AYC Fund's help) and we will work hard to utilize all 18 boats. After all of the fleets are properly represented, we will make room for a few Roadrunner teams, UT Sailing Club, UT Sailing Team members and at-large entries.

Like last year, the fleet that is able to raise the most money above and beyond the \$200 entry fee will be awarded 1st place in the initial race. 2nd highest fund raising fleet will be awarded 2nd, and so on. We will run as many raises as possible until 4:00, and afterwards we will have beer, wine and snacks and we will recognize the top fleets.

Once again, the proceeds from the event will benefit the AYC Fund and its support for sail training, racing and education here in Texas. Please reach out to your fellow fleet members and fleet captains and start organizing

Challenges of the Day

The month of June was a great time to halt our hectic work schedule and go for a sail. The weather could not have been more favorable as we packed our vessel for a cruise down the coastline of Texas. Our group of 10 boats rolled out of Kemah as diamonds of early morning dew sparkled on the foredecks. Entering Galveston Bay, we pointed our bows toward Galveston Island and beyond. Some boats chose the off-shore route while others hugged the banks of the Inter-coastal Waterway. Freeport, Matagorda, Port O'Conner, Costa Granda, Rockport, Port Aransas and Corpus Christi all beckoned us with their promise of cool winds, blue water and sandy beaches.

Each day, we glided slowly and purposefully through channels and swells. Morning coffee, served at the helm, delivered both flavor and anticipation for the new day at hand. Tied up by mid-afternoon, we would retreat to our saloons and treat ourselves to a chapter from our favorite book. With waves gently lapping at the waterline of our hulls, we rediscovered the pleasure of afternoon naps. Chocolate and caramel topping on Blue Bell ice cream became the perfect recipe when the temps crept above 90 degrees.

At 6:00 PM everyone would gather for Docktails. Some chose wine while others selected their favorite micro-brews. Seated in a large circle, each skipper was anxious to share his tough challenges of the day. At 7:00 PM our quest for fresh seafood would begin. What fun it was to hayride together in a SUV drawn trailer all the way to Spoonbills restaurant. Speaking of Spoonbills, many of these birds were observed along the channels fully dressed in bright pink plumage.

The Sand Man arrived around 10:00 PM each evening. "Good night, John Boy! Good night Mom & Pop!" Morning came early as heads could be seen popping up through the companion way hatches. "Oh, man, another hard day of sailing is at hand. Gosh, life is tuff!"

For some extra excitement, we decided to join three other boats for a sail down the Colorado River Bypass. Yes, this Colorado is the same one that streams through Lake Travis. Recently completed by the Army Core of Engineers, this bypass channel starts at the Inner Coastal and spills out into the Gulf of Mexico. The bypass is populated by lake houses on the left and marshes on the right all along its six-knot length. "Did everyone see the wild boars standing on the bank?" As we approached the opening into the Gulf, we discovered an incoming tide and sharp five-foot waves rising up to push us backward. We made slow headway between the narrow rock walls with our engines up to full throttle. Our knuckles turned white as we each gripped our helms and plowed over the confused sea. Our bows pitched high in the air and then slammed down deep under the foamy whitecaps. We rocked and rolled over depths of 12 feet, 20 feet, 30 feet and finally 40 feet below our keels. At 40 feet, our vessels began to stabilize. We trimmed our canvas, set our waypoint and prepared for our 40 mile journey toward the Freeport jetties. After several hours, the swells and wind began to subside. As the Freeport channel marks came into sight, someone shouted "Hey, this is a perfect time to go for a swim!" After trimming the vessel to a hove-to position, we took turns plunging into the salty blue.


At 6:00 PM everyone gathered for Docktails. Glasses overflowed among kindred spirits as once again, skippers shared stories about the challenges of the day.

The weather was perfect, with breezes out of the South Southeast at 8 to 12 MPH

all day. There were a few clouds to block the sun and the temperature remained in the low 90's on the water.

We had 24 boats in four starts: Multihull, Spin A (faster) Spin B (slower) and Non Spin. Multihulls got away first with **Mike Beuerlein** screaming out of AYC to cross the line a few minutes late in his F18, throwing up a small rooster tail behind, clearly a man on a mission. About 55 minutes later he came by the committee boat on his second lap, rooster tail still going, leading the fleet. The RC began to have doubts whether they had set a long enough course to satisfy the Notice of Race promise of a three-hour cruise.

Beuerlein continued his rapid pace and eventually completed the 10.9 mile course in just under two hours, correcting out over Steve Frick's F30 by 22 minutes. Meanwhile Doug Casey in the F31 and Jon Kuc in the F750 waged a tremendous duel with Casey final correcting out over Kuc by four seconds.

Ray Shull and John Bartlett got off to a good start in the A Spin fleet; in fact it was too good as both were called back for being on the course side. Some grumbling was heard as they came back by the RC boat to

clear the start line but they quickly got back racing and both went on to take podium finishes, Bartlett in the J/80 was first to the line in 2:33:33 (corrected) and Shull in the J/29 was second to finish but ended up third after giving more than a minute per mile on the 10.9 mile course to the J/22 of John Halter. Brent Schwan in a J/80 was 14 seconds behind Halter, followed by John Maddalazzo the only non J-Boat in his Capri 25, Greg Scully, also in a J/80 and Roseanne Butera in her J/22.

Three South Coasts and an Ensign, all flying chutes made up the Spin B fleet. **George Dahmen,** in a South Coast, showed everyone the fast way around the 8.1 mile course, followed by **Jeff Brock** in a SC 21, **David Morley** in an Ensign and **Carl Wiseman** in another SC 21.

Non Spin fleet put the most boats on the line with nine yachts jockeying for position as the horn sounded. **Deke Dekeyser** had the Alerion Catboat out with his crew, and they were second across the line but after the scoring program applied the handicaps Deke had first by over eight and a half minutes. **Trey Clawson** in an Ensign also corrected out over **Trey AmRhein's** Catalina 27 who was first to finish the 8.1 mile course. **Bill Casnovsky**, Columbia 26; **Charlie Mayne**, Canadian Seacraft 30; **Robert Anderson**, Catalina 250; **Keith Renard**, Catalina 27; **Steve Ehlers**, Catalina 30; and **Byan Leasure**, Hunter 31 rounded out this division. The last boat finished at 4:51:25 only a minute and twenty five seconds past the promised three hour cruise, so the RC heaved a collective sigh of relief and headed back to the harbor.

The after party featured sour cream enchiladas (see recipe on page 22) with pasta salad, frijoles, and Texas Caviar, paired with your choice of Shiner Bock or Bud Light and some delightful box wines. Desserts were red, white and blue cupcakes, and scrumptious key lime pie which I overdosed on, sending my blood sugar to the sky. I quickly went onto exercise mode, walking down and back up the concrete incline formerly known as the north launch ramp in order to get back in balance. I can tell you the pie was worth the walk.

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
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




In the capsize drill, after a demonstration by a junior coach, an Opti is "turtled", and each kid takes a turn righting it. Most of the kids are successful, and after each rights the boat, the other kids applaud!

For the balloon fetch, the junior coaches randomly spread balloons across the cove and the kids, two to a boat, see how many balloons they can pick up. Their attention is on the balloons, not on sailing technique, and "Voila!," they sail well!



Conrad P. Werkenthin was born at Brackenridge Hospital on November 21, 1932 to Max and Louise Werkenthin as their fourth child following Louise, Fred and Max. He was supposed to be a girl. He attended Robert E. Lee, University Junior High, Austin High and the University of Texas. He graduated with a BBA and LLB.

When he was 10, Conrad was the manager of the C&S Sub Junior Indians and they won the 12 and under city title in 1945. It is now called Little League. He played baseball at Austin High and the University where the team won three Southwest Conference titles and went to the College World Series

twice, coming in second in 1953. At Austin High he was a member of Forrest Guynn Cook club and in college he was a member of Delta Tau Delta. Following law school he was on active duty with the 8th Army in Germany, and after a stint in the reserves was Honorably Discharged as a Captain.

Conrad returned to Austin and joined Clark, Thomas and Winters law firm on September 22, 1957 and practiced law there until March of 2010 when the firm dissolved and he became Of Counsel with The Akin Firm. During his career he was named Best Lawyer and aided and assisted many clients. He served on many Boards and Committees including being an Elder in the Presbyterian Church and a long time member of the Board of Texas Aviation Association. He enjoyed many years of coaching youth baseball from Little League to American Legion. He loved flying and sailing on Lake Travis and Penobscot Bay in Maine during many hot Texas summers. He enjoyed building and being a part owner of Dodd Street Docks on Lake Travis for 34 years.

Conrad was married to Clare Coates of Austin in 1956 until her death in 2009 after suffering 10 years of debilitating Alzheimer's disease. Together they had two children, Lou and Art. Lou is married to Jim Clark and there are two grandchildren, Morgan who graduated from Colorado University and James Conrad who is enrolled in Texas A&M University. After Clare's death, Conrad married Sue Stegall whose love has given later life meaning and he is survived by her son and family, Josh who is married to Amber and their son, Eli and daughter Sydney; and by Parker and granddaughters, Zoe and Tricia; and three great grandchildren.

Pat Manning's Best Ever Sour Cream Enchiladas

1 lb chicken breast, diced 1 medium onion, chopped 1 T vegetable oil

8 flour tortillas, softened (8-in each)

1 ½ cups grated Monterey jack cheese or Mexican blend cheese, divided

1/4 cup butter 1/4 cup flour 1 15-oz can chicken broth 1 cup sour cream 1 4-oz can chopped green chiles

- 1. In frypan, cook chicken and onion together in oil over medium heat until chicken is just done.
- 2. Divide cooked chicken/onion mixture evenly between 8 tortillas; add 1 ½ T cheese to each tortilla.
- 3. Roll enchiladas and place seam-side down in 9X13 baking dish lightly sprayed with cooking spray.
- 4. Melt butter in a medium saucepan; stir in flour to make a roux; stir and cook until bubbly; gradually whisk in chicken broth then bring to boiling, stirring frequently.
- 5. Remove from heat; stir in sour cream and green chiles; pour sauce evenly over enchiladas.
- 6. Top with remaining cheese (baking dish may be double-wrapped and frozen at this point) and bake at 400F for 20 minutes until cheese is melted and sauce near edges of baking dish is bubbly.

There is no such thing as too much cheese on top.
