#### A Near Miss

The torrential rains the night of October 30 fell just outside of our basin. The heavy downpours, at times at rates exceeding three inches per hour, resulted in rainfall totals exceeding 10 inches in the Onion Creek basin just southeast of Austin and as much as 14 inches in a few isolated places in

the Blanco River basin. Had this same train of storms tracked 30 miles to the west, we would have seen a tremendous lake rise. The last time the Lake Travis basin had a single rain event with rainfall totals in the teens was the summer of 2007, and in that event the lake rose nearly 30 feet to peak at 701 MSL — a whopping 76 feet higher than we are today!

As our 2013 season winds down, there are a few remaining chances to sail, and a few key events to draw your attention to. For sailing, we wrap up the Fall Series races on Sunday, November 17. That same week, on Thursday the 21st, we hold our annual general membership meeting. Please send in your proxy forms and try to attend. In this meeting we will vote on our 2014 board member nominees, and you'll also get to hear from each current board member a summary of the year. Think of it as a "state of the union" address for your club. We end the week with the last racing event of the year with the Keel Fleet-sponsored Wild Turkey Regatta held on Saturday, November 23. 
#### **Junior Training News**





#### Harvest Moon 2013 by Ray Shull

The decision to race in the 2013 Harvest Moon Regatta from Galveston to Port Aransas was made shortly after I purchased a Beneteau 42 in mid-September, I started looking for a boat for some long distance cruising early in 2013. At that time I had decided to retire (from real work) in the last part of this year and embark on a long time dream of cruising the Gulf of Mexico, the Caribbean, and maybe beyond.

After checking out boats from three to 30 years old, from 35 feet to 50 feet in length, and from ketch rigs to unstayed cat rig boats, the boat I liked the best was a Beneteau 423 that was in very good condition, had been well taken care of, had most of the desired equipment I wanted and was well rated by most of the sailing websites.

She was purchased by September 28, which left only three weeks for evaluating all of the numerous systems on this boat and getting to know the sailing ability of the boat before the Harvest Moon race. It didn't seem like much time to make sure that a boat was ready for a 150 mile off-shore race and the (usually) even longer return trip back to its home harbor, but it seemed that to not attempt this race would be a future regret. With three trips to Clear Lake to check everything out, I thought everything was ready for the Regatta by the day of the race and ... As Captain Ron would say, "If it's going to happen, it's going to happen out there."

The crew for the race was comprised of Bobby Crouch, Tommy Gairloff, Hillary Anderson, Sandra and me. We looked forward to seeing how our AYC crew, sailing a vessel that was new to us, would compare to the experienced off-shore sailors of the Gulf Coast. This race was actually the very first time we would take the Beneteau out of its slip with the exception of the survey and a quick motoring over to the pump-out!

We raced in the non-spinnaker division which was the largest class of the Regatta, with 110 boats entered and all starting in one start. Our fleet within this division was composed of Beneteaus, Hunters, Catalinas and Morgans, all in the 34 to 42 foot size. These boats appeared to be of similar type and performance, with the PHRF range of only 15 seconds per mile from the fastest rated boat (us) to the slowest boat in our fleet. We looked forward to fairly close racing and hoped that the start was not too chaotic with this large number of boats.

We left our slip in Clear Lake the morning of the race at about 8am for our start time of 2pm off of Galveston Island. With a sailing distance to the start of approximately 28 miles, a significant portion of the sailing involves sailing to the start line.

We arrived at the starting area somewhere around 1:30pm and were pleased to see that the starting line was at least a half-mile long stretching from the pier on shore to a large buoy. At our appointed start time, we managed to start cleanly, avoided the large pile-up that occurred at the buoy, and set our course for the first rounding mark off of Freeport.

We guickly saw that one of the competitors in our fleet had a surprising amount of boat speed in the medium winds and was quickly distancing themselves from the rest of the fleet, as well as the entire non-spinnaker division. We tried everything to match their speed with different sail trim, winging out the jib, sailing a higher angle, but nothing could catch this speedy competitor.

As sunset approached, this boat became a speck on the horizon, with a lead of over a mile on us. Two other of our fleet competitors also appeared to be in front of us, not a good sign when you are supposed to be the fastest boat in your fleet. However, in the medium air that we were experiencing, it just didn't seem that we had the speed to keep up with them.

Fortunately, as the night descended and the full moon lit the way down the Gulf, the wind increased to a speed more to our liking. By midnight the wind was in the high teens and occasionally in the low to mid 20s. We had settled on a wing-on-wing configuration with the jib poled out on the port side of the boat. With this, we tried to sail at a constant apparent wind angle of approximately 140 to 150 degrees, which seemed to be the best combination of boat speed and the direct course to our next mark.

We maintained this tack through the night and well into the next morning. By early the next morning the winds were consistently in the low 20s, with gusts approaching 30 knots. It was fairly difficult to hold this course as the waves became larger, wanting to push us one way, the wind wanting to push us a different direction, and we found ourselves surfing down the impressive following swells that would also quickly change the balance of the boat. We fought this battle all night long.

By first light on Friday morning, there were several boats around us but they were too far away to determine if they were our fleet competitors or boats

from another fleet. Our first positive indication was the sighting of a multihull competitor a couple of miles off shore from our location.

We felt that if we were within sight of one of the fast multi-hull boats, then maybe we had done okay during the night sailing. When we were within cell phone range of Port Aransas, we checked the positions of our competitors and found that the Hunter that sped away at the start was approximately three miles to our stern and in second place behind us. The other two boats that were ahead of us at sunset were also even further back behind. We were pretty excited at how our night sailing had paid off in our standings. It made all of the battles with the waves in the dark worth it many times over.

As we made our way into the final turn at the jetties of Port Aransas at approximately 2pm on Friday, we heard the other boats checking in with the finishing race committee and fortunately didn't hear any of our other competitor's names as we signaled our arrival. Later we found out that we had indeed won our fleet and were over an hour ahead of the second place boat.

We were feeling mighty proud that a bunch of Lake Travis sailors had done so well in this, our first race with the boat in the big waves and winds of the Gulf. We made our way to the marina for a weekend of relaxation, celebration, joining other AYC members who made the trip, and meeting new sailors as they arrived.

Other AYC boats that entered the regatta were Doug Casey's "Tribology" and Steve Frick's "Tritium". Additionally Pat Caughey and Ken Taylor from AYC raced on other boats. Tribology took a second place in their fleet, missing first place by only 10 seconds after the 150 mile race. Pat Caughey raced on Charlie Singstad's Pacific Seacraft and finished first in their fleet. We met with them several times over the weekend at Port Aransas.

It was a great race for all those representing AYC. One of our fondest memories, though, will be the 15-plus AYC racers and friends that were the loudest and most celebratory group at the trophy presentation. That really made us proud as they announced our name and the AYC group yelled their support. We were thrilled to receive the trophy for winning our fleet and happy to enjoy it with many of our friends.

#### J/24 Launching

## Sailing on Tuesdays by Jiim Johnstone

I turned 65 in October and completed a rite of passage by signing up for Medicare. I feel really grown up now. I am enjoying senior discounts at the movies and restaurants and get into National Parks (when they are open) for free with my Senior Pass. But the best thing about being 65 is the Sailing on Tuesday Society (SOTS) at AYC.

There is no age requirement. To be a SOT, you just need to have the time and energy to show up Tuesday afternoons for a pleasant sail around the lake with a cockpit full of sailors, usually three or four quys with combined

Last week there were enough of us that we took out two Ensigns. The Ensign has a nice cockpit that seats a lot of SOTS and can hold a lot of beer coolers. It has a nice high freeboard so we do not have to worry about falling out. Some of the SOTS are not as agile as they once were. My only complaint about the Ensign is that it needs more cup holders for this type of sailing.

Some Ensigns are cleverly rigged with special blocks and "Magic Boxes" that make sail trim easier when racing. And since we did have two Ensigns on the water at the same time, what started as a simple pleasure cruise evolved into a friendly competition.



There was no course or official start, just a simple glance from one skipper to the other and the race was on. We were doing fine until the crew started making suggestions:

Crew 1: "You ought to tack now. You can lee bow him."

Crew 2: "No, don't tack yet, get past the point, so you don't run aground, then tack."

Crew 3: "Trim the main in more. You're footing off too much.""

Skipper: "What time is it? Is it time to go in yet? My lights don't work you know."

Crew 4: "In that case, I'll have another beer. By the way, did you hear the one about the man who asked his wife what she wanted for her birthday and she said, 'A divorce!' to which he replied, 'I wasn't thinking about spending that much.""


